**EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR LETTER TO THE ASSOCIATION
2020-2021 ANNUAL REPORT**

After 2020 and the succession of hurricanes and Covid 19, we were hoping that 2021 would begin to have a greater feel of normalcy in ministry and missions for the churches of the Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge. For the most part, the only normality that we have been able to experience in ministry is the fact that most of our churches are consistently meeting weekly for worship. However, due to the Covid variants and governmental guidelines, having small groups, camps, and mission trips has been very challenging and at times extremely frustrating. And yet much work, much good, and great ministry has been occurring in these times.

Disaster Relief:

Disaster Relief continues to be a strong and strategic ministry as evidenced in the mid May 2021 when a sudden storm brought heavy flooding to our area. Our office served as the Incident Command Center for about two weeks to coordinate with mud outs and restorations of homes in our area. Then the big one, *Hurricane Ida*, made her visit on the anniversary of Katrina, August 29, and did massive damage to our region, especially south and east of us. Our churches responded along with our LBC DR leadership to do great and effective work in the aftermath and this work is still on going.

New BAGBR Pastors:

By the end of 2020, eighteen of the churches in our association were without pastors. In January 2021, God began to fill these vacancies with some outstanding pastors to lead our churches:

- January—Norman Elrod at Grace Baptist Church Mid-City and Mardy Guidry at Fellowship Baptist Church in Central
- February—Jeff Vincent at First Baptist Church of New Roads
- March—Allan Myers at First Baptist Church of Krotz Springs
- May—Chase Permenter at Comite Baptist Church and Trae Norsworthy at River Bend Baptist Church
- June—Terry Simoneaux at Sorrento Baptist Church
- July—Tim Keith at Istrouma Baptist Church; David Brown, Jr., at Community Bible Baptist Church and Daniel Burnham, Jr. at Bayou Plaquemine Baptist Church
- October—Marvin Parks at Glen Oaks Baptist Church

I am grateful for these eleven new pastors and am praying that all our current vacancies will be filled in the very near future.

BAGBR Staffing:

Staffing at BAGBR has been full of rapid changes.

- Dr. Chuck Lowman retired as January 1 of this year after serving for seven wonderful years with the association.

- On the same date, Dr. Steve Beckham began serving as our Multicultural Strategist and Church Planting Consultant. Steve hit the ground running and since then his pace has increased; he is doing an amazing ministry in multiple places and filling multiple needs—God’s timing is always perfect.
- Pastor Randy Osborn who had worked with us for seven years, as our Compassion Missionary and Disaster Relief Coordinator, felt God’s direction to return to his home area of ministry in Broken Arrow, OK. Sadly, for us, Randy concluded his effective ministry with us in May of this year.

Missions Trips:

- Mission trips have been challenging to schedule and organize especially with the current world dynamics of Covid 19 and political/cultural unrest. My planned trip to South Asia had to be cancelled as well as this summer’s trip to Eastern Europe.
- Thankfully, I was able to lead a team of thirteen to Eastern Europe for a very fruitful mission experience in late September.

Mission Awareness:

- Mission awareness however has not been stifled at all because this summer we have had the incredible opportunity of hosting three IMB affinity group/partnership missions/area coordinators at BAGBR: Jeff Ginn from South America, Kyle Kirkpatrick from South/Central Europe, and Mick Stockwell from Eastern Europe. Each of these meetings were attended by over twenty pastors and staff members enabling strategic relationships and partnerships to be established for long term ministry/mission connections.
- The highlight for mission awareness was the weekend of August 22 with our World Missions Conference at Jefferson Baptist Church. We had the most incredible honor to host the President of IMB, Dr. Paul Chitwood as our keynote speaker. It was a most impacting weekend for many of our churches and personally encouraging to me to be able to spend time such a godly man who is leading our Southern Baptist Convention in advancing missions to the ends of the earth.

On a personal note, thank you BAGBR churches for your support throughout this year. I count it a joy and a privilege to serve our Lord and serve the great churches of the Baptist Association of Great Baton Rouge.

Missions:

Missions still have been a key focus although the rise of Covid 19 has slowed down the process considerably.

- Although several mission trips and traveling abroad have been cancelled, God is still at work. An African American and Anglo group teamed up to go on mission. Church of Life Fellowship was able to successfully team up with Woodlawn Baptist and do missions in Utah this summer.
- The local association also had the opportunity to host three IMB area missions/area coordinators.
- The BAGBR World Missions Conference was held at Jefferson Baptist with President of IMB, Dr. Paul Chitwood as our speaker.
- Pastor John Adams and the mission house at Cedarcrest Baptist received exterior paint, a new roof, new windows, and several interior modifications to give it a face lift. They are currently housing a mission family and look forward to doing so in the future.

Disaster Relief:

We had the opportunity during mud outs to minister to several families during the heavy flood which invaded the Baton Rouge area in May. We were also able to help facilitate and host a group of out-of-town guests at the BAGBR office which came in to help mud out and gut properties. Hurricane Ida restorations are still underway, however we have had the opportunity with local churches to help feed and walk along side residents in the river parishes, as well as New Orleans with roof tarping, gut outs, etc.

Strategy and Church Planting:

It has been a joy assisting many churches with vacant pulpits and having the opportunity to walk alongside new church plants. Working with our local church planting, restart initiative, people group engagement, and fresh start advisory teams have provided great insight. The future still looks bright regardless of the Covid 19 setback.

God has allowed BAGBR to install David Brown, Jr., at Community Bible Baptist, help provide Interim leadership Miller Jackson at Glen Oaks Baptist, as well as walk alongside several other non-Anglo works. Pastor Miller Jackson and the Scarlet Cord church plant are going strong. They have had the opportunity to serve their new community in Sorrento on multiple occasions as they prepare to open the facility God blessed them with. It has also been a pleasure working with Pastor Kevin Snaril and True Hope in the Plaquemine area. They have purchased a facility with a daycare/academy and are currently working on a drug rehabilitation housing unit. We are excited about what God is doing and look forward to what the future holds.

**ACADIAN BAPTIST CENTER

A lot has happened since last year when our summer camps were cancelled for the first time in our history. If you remember, we finished the new Worship Center just in time for summer camp when the pandemic took off forcing camps across the country to not have overnight camps. We cut staff and expenses as low as possible. Then the hurricanes hit Louisiana; we were not close enough to be a great staging area but not close to receive major damage. Acadian Baptist Center was able to host evacuees, mission teams, utility companies and Red Cross workers for a couple of months. This proved to be a great help and opportunity for ministry. Later as we got into 2021, retreats started to come back. Numerous churches, associations and individuals made donations to help see us through the hard times. Lots of volunteers helped serve in the cafeteria, mow grass and do repairs to help with a smaller staff. The summer of 2021 dawned with cautious optimism.

Our golf tournament went very well thanks to Mitch Pierrotti. Also, our Survivorman weekend had close to one hundred boys/men, it was enjoyed by all. Hurricane Ida sent us a lot of evacuees, mostly from Golden Meadow and some Cleco lineman.

ABC hosted close to three thousand this past summer which is down from two years ago but great compared to last year. ABC lost its Staff Director this summer due to illness. Michael Pappas loved Jesus and was a dedicated worker and great friend. His memorial service was held in the Worship Center. Be in prayer for his family and friends as he will sorely be missed.

Despite the heartache among our staff, God touched many lives this summer. We recorded ninety-five Professions of Faith, seventy-one rededications, four to full time Christian service, twenty-one for baptism and sixty-one other decisions. Thank you for your faithful support of ABC over the years. We have faith God will navigate us through these uncertain times. The Mission Statement of the Baptist Collegiate Ministry at Louisiana State University is “Knowing Christ and Making Him Known.” The BCM is a religious organization serving the students on the LSU campus. Our BCM had to adjust our ministry due to the coronavirus for the 2020-2021 school year.



We exist to:

1. Reach students for Christ
2. Connect students to a local church
3. Strengthen students in their faith
4. Mobilize students for missions and leadership

The following are reports about specific ministry areas.

1. Leadership Team – During the 2021-2022 school year, forty-two students serve on our BCM Leadership Team. These students plan, coordinate, and implement our BCM ministries.
2. Attendance – Over seven hundred different LSU students attended one or more of the BCM ministries during the 2020-2021 school year. Four hundred have attended BCM ministries thus far this school year.
3. The Connection Worship - The Connection is held at 7:00 P.M. each Thursday night. The Connection is a time of praise and worship followed by a speaker. Our average weekly attendance for the school year is 120.
4. Family Group Bible Studies - The BCM and the Collegiate churches of the BCM sponsored over fifteen Bible study groups each week involving over one hundred students.
5. Evangelism – Twenty-two students confessed Christ as Savior during the 2020-2021 school year.
6. Disasters Relief – The BCM went to the Lake Charles area in the Fall of 2020 to do DR six different times. The BCM has completed seven different DR trips since Hurricane Ida.

7. Ski Trip Bible Conference - Seventy of our BCM students and staff participated in our Ski Trip in January of 2021. We are going back to Winter Park, Colorado in January of 2022. We already have sixty-nine students signed up.
8. Mexico Mission Trip - The BCM is going on a Mission Trip to Mexico in December of 2021.
9. International Ministry – There are over 1,800 international students attending LSU from over 120 different countries. The LSU BCM sponsors a weekly International Student Dinner on Monday at 5:30 P.M. Over two hundred different international students have attended during the 2020-2021 school year. The BCM has provided Food to Go Boxes for 200 different international students.
10. Freshmen Leadership Team – Over 20 freshmen are serving on the BCM Freshmen Leadership Team. This is a leadership/discipleship group for freshmen.
11. Church Camp Staffers/Church Interns – Twenty BCM students served as interns at their church or at a church camp, such as Pine Cove, Sky Ranch, Centrifuge, Kanakuk, or Camp Ozark in the summer.
12. Mission Trips – The BCM is planning to go on mission trips during Spring Break of 2022 to Florida, Utah, and Chicago.

The Cooperative Program of the Louisiana Baptist Convention pays the salary of the BCM Director and for one-half of the salary of the Associate BCM Director. The Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge and individual collegiate churches of BAGBR pay for the building and ministry expenses of the BCM. The BCM is also dependent on individual contributions from alumni, parents of past and current students and interested individuals.

BAPTIST COLLEGIATE MINISTRY - NICHOLLS STATE UNIVERSITY
2020-2021 ANNUAL REPORT

The last school year was a great year for the ministry at Nicholls State University, but one that again has been buffeted by factors outside of our control. The first part of the year (Fall 2020) saw vastly restrictive measures in place because of Covid-19's impact. We were restricted from our more traditional efforts (including the free lunches, outreach dinners, large group Bible Study, and our on-campus water bottle outreach). We pivoted as a ministry and decided to focus on small group discipleship and outreach through small community events. Family groups were staged throughout the week to keep numbers manageable. These featured wonderful times of intimate Bible study that saw bonds formed and friendships

developed. The lack of our Thursday night Bible Study was difficult to live with. We petitioned the school for special allowance and were eventually approved to have the meetings outdoors, but this was not accomplished until nearly the end of the semester.

This fall semester also featured the arrival of several hurricanes of note (Sally and of course Laura). These tragic events allowed us to rally students from all walks of life to participate in disaster relief efforts in Lake Charles and in Alexandria. God really used these times of DR work to strengthen and bond our students. This effort now seemed prophetic, as all those students were better equipped to have dealt with Ida this year.

The second semester (Spring 2021) saw a loosening of the previously ironclad restrictions. We moved to having our Bible Study more frequently. There was still a prohibition on our weekly lunches, so that continued to be discontinued. We were allowed to do various specific outreaches, as long as certain precautions being met. We contributed students to a local association's D-Now work that happened at Mulberry Baptist. This was the first D-Now our students had been allowed to participate in for the last two years. We also were blessed by God to take a dozen students on a Spring Break Mission trip to our long-time ministry partner Virginia Tech BCM. We spent a week taking part in their ministry efforts and making improvements to their ministry center. This was a very blessing filled trip and our students returned with fire and enthusiasm for the ongoing work.

The difficulty of these two semesters has meant that our numbers are down from where we would normally like them to be, however the strength of the current students' relationships and the community they are producing – complete with spiritual growth and encouragement – has been the most encouraging thing to come out of this school year. We are so thankful for the support of this association in reaching the lost at Nicholls. We could not do what we do without the Association. The coming year we are excited about the new freshmen coming in, while lamenting the excellent group of seniors we are sending back out to local congregations, more fully equipped. Thank you again for your support monetarily and through prayer! We look forward to many more years of cooperation with the awesome churches of the association.

 2. I also met individually or in smaller groups with students throughout the week for more in-depth study on discipleship.
 3. We had a small movie night where we watched and discussed a documentary about the prosperity gospel.
 4. We participated in a virtual discipleship conference featuring Roy "Soup" Campbell, one of the founders of Kids Across America.

- This Fall we have been able to begin meeting again in person and are having an in-person Bible Study in the Union on Southern's campus every Tuesday night at 6:30.
 - We are planning to partner with other BCM's to engage in disaster relief activities as our state and churches recover from Hurricane Ida.
 - We also plan to take some of our male students to a local men's discipleship conference happening in November.
 - Depending on the progression of Covid, we will also be participating in community service activities through the University.

The BCM at Southern University is excited about the ministry partners and pastors that we have been blessed to serve alongside as we push forward to reaching the Southern University Campus.

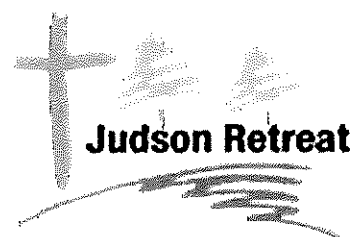
DISASTER RELIEF / RESPONSE

Praise the Lord for He is good, His love endures forever - Through the generous giving of churches, individuals and even another camp, Judson Retreat survived 2020 and began 2021 with hope. Our hope rest fully and completely in the Lord Jesus Christ, and it was by his hand that we are still here. While resting in His hope, we began 2021 longing for a return to normal, but sadly that return has yet to be realized. Judson Retreat sat empty for the months of January and February as people were still uncomfortable with the COVID situation. March through May showed little improvement as we hosted five retreats (2 overnight and 3-day events) during those months. The state-maintained limitations on our capacity all the way through our summer camping season, limiting us to 50% capacity. But slowly summer camp registrations rolled in, and we were thankful to be able to host campers again. It may not have been the numbers we would have liked, but the Lord is good. Seeing children and youth laughing, swimming, playing in the creek, riding horses and most importantly, learning about Jesus was healing to the souls of our staff. In a year of financial hardship, it was therapeutic to get to invest in and love on campers.

Summer Camp Program - Our summer camp program was limited by the mandates of our Governor; camps could host overnight groups at 50% capacity. We praise the Lord for a full 10 weeks of summer camp activities with no COVID issues. We had seven rental camps to use our facility during the summer, and we programed eleven of our own camps. We were blessed to have a wonderful staff who served the Lord with gladness and served our campers with compassion and grace. Our staff this summer truly set a Christlike example to every person who set foot on the Judson Retreat Center Property. We were blessed to be at or near capacity for both Horse Camps, Basic Training (boys camp), and Warrior Week (teen guys).

Basic Training, GROW Camps and Connect Camps - The theme for our mission camps this summer was "The Kingdom." The campers learned that the Kingdom of God is upside down to this world. They left the week truly knowing that as a child of God we are called to live a life that is radically different than the world around them. And in doing so they will be a witness to who God is and might help bring others into the Kingdom of God. "Jesus replied, "I tell you the truth, unless you are born again, you cannot see the Kingdom of God." John 3:3

Warrior Week - ONE! Becoming Godly men begins when we surrender ourselves to the Lord. In that surrender we understand that God is the only true God, and that we are to live our lives dedicated to his will. "There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all." Ephesians 4:4-6 This year was very exciting for our Warrior Week Camp, more than doubling the previous year's attendance. It was awesome to see twenty-three young men exploring the truth of Biblical Manhood and bonding with each other and the male staff and leaders. We look forward to what the Lord is doing in this camp in the coming years.

Horse Camp - Our horse camp is always fun and full of adventure, but it is not just about riding horses. Our campers do learn about riding, tack, anatomy of horses and many other techniques and skills, but they also spend lots of time in the Word of God. This year we focused on Proverbs 21:31, "The horse is made ready for the day of battle, but the victory belongs to the LORD." The campers talked in depth about Spiritual warfare and how our victory is in the Lord.

BLOOM Camp - This year's theme was "Not I but Christ." We focused on Galatians 2:20, "I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me." During the week of camp, we really wanted the young women to understand who they are in Christ, but to understand that truth they must first understand who God is. During worship and quiet times each day they focused on these three things... God is Holy, God is Love and God is Sovereign. It was an incredible week for these young ladies.

The Forge Discipleship Institute - Building on last year's pilot program for The Forge Discipleship Institute, we continued to deeply invest in our staff during the summer months. Hosting summer camps this summer did not allow us the same amount of time with our staff as last summer, but we were still able to do some amazing things in the areas of discipleship and accountability. Our staff met each week as we worked through the book of James together on Sunday nights. There was always great discussion and lots of good questions raised. The staff also read through the book "The Heart Attitudes: Seven Keys to Healthy Biblical Community" which really began to change their thinking of what it looks like to love others as Jesus loves them. Accountability is always a must for our staff, and this summer was no different as the staff learned what it means to live in accountable relationships with one another. They met weekly in accountability groups, working through struggles, issues, good times and bad. It was amazing to watch these young men and women grow deep relationships as brothers and sisters in Christ.

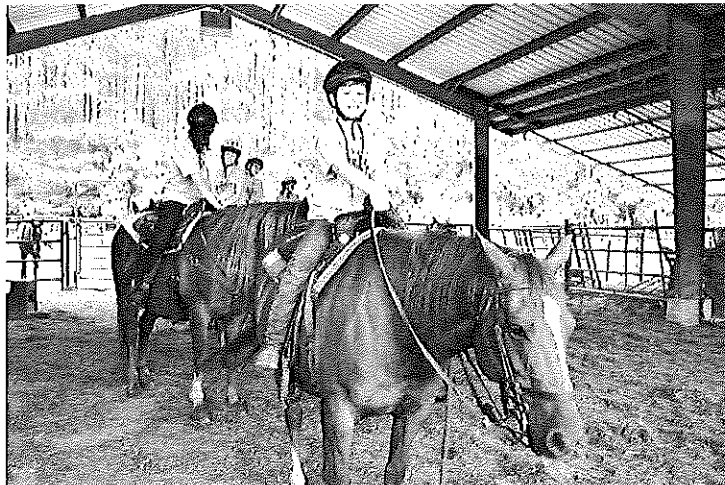
Fall and Spring Retreats - From August of 2020 to May of 2021 we hosted eleven rental groups. We had college groups, ladies groups, high school groups, Hispanic groups, church picnics, Father/Daughter campouts, Boy Scout Groups and others. We ministered to Baptist, Methodist, Catholics and more, and we even programmed four Mother/Daughter horse weekends, and our first Warrior Weekend for junior high and high school guys. We would have loved to have had a full calendar of events but the limitations of COVID and COVID mandates made it difficult. But even in a down year, we were thrilled when we were able to host groups here at Judson. It is always good to observe the Lord working in and through the lives of those who choose to seek Him here.

Camper on Mission Report - Over this year Judson has hosted over 36 Camper on Mission Volunteers. During their time serving at Judson this year, they have amassed over 1200-man hours. We are so blessed to have such willing and skilled people who love the Lord and love the ministry of Judson Retreat Center. This year they did several construction projects, repairing siding and facia on our cabins, building a stage for our new amphitheater complete with lights and electrical plugs. They also assisted with cleaning the chapel, assisted in the kitchen, cleaned the concession stand, fixed broken pipes from the freeze this winter, changed all outside pipes over to pex pipe, painted the horse program directors house, deep cleaned the cabins, reorganized closets, and converted 90% of the camp over to LED lighting. They are a real blessing to Judson Retreat. And the Busby kids (Samuel, Micah John and Beka) really enjoyed getting to play dominos with them each night.

Eternal Significance - Camps and Retreats are always fun, with lots of games and activities. The food is always good (we have the best cooks in the world), and the beauty of God's creation is ever before you at Judson. But the reason we do what we do, is not because of the fun and games, or even the great food or the beautiful scenery. We are here to know God and to make Him known. We at Judson exist to raise up disciples who are rooted in the word, growing in their faith and reaching out to others. And over the summer we celebrated sixteen salvations, and scores of other decisions from our campers who want to be passionate for Jesus. Praise be to God!

2021 - 42 years of Investment into Camps and Retreat Groups: Now is the time for reinvestment - In 42 years, Judson Retreat has been blessed to be a place where investment has been made into the lives of so many. So many have met Christ here, so many called to ministry, so many called to missions, so many called to be disciple makers wherever they go. Now after 42 years Judson Retreat is in need of some investment, investment for repairs to our facility, investment for needed updates, investment for

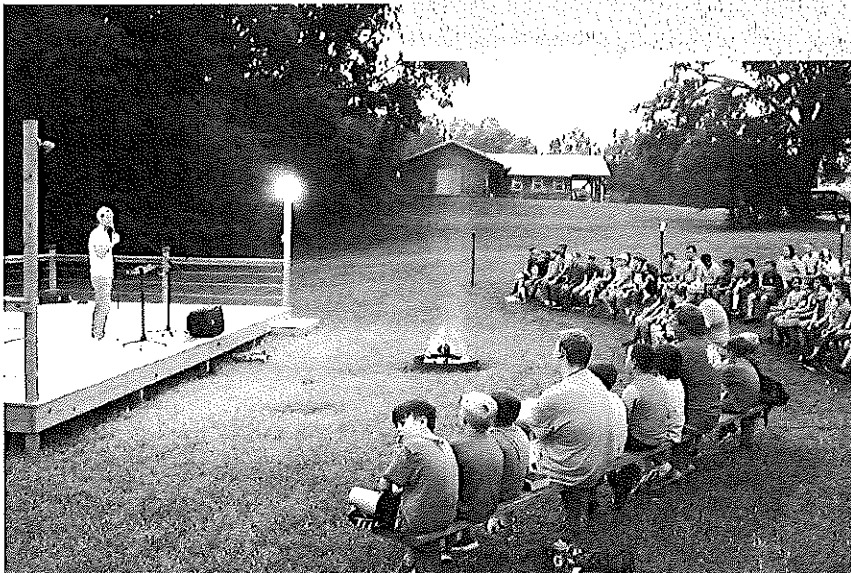

The COVID 19 pandemic has created another interesting and challenging year for the NOBTS program at Louisiana State Penitentiary. Last year the school was closed for seven months. This resulted in a break between the start and finish of the Spring 2020 semester. Classes did resume in September of 2020, allowing for the completion of the term.

The Spring semester started in January and with God's help finished in May, just before another closing. This closing resulted in missing a summer class entirely and delayed the start of the Fall 2021 semester. The good news is that thirty-two men finished their course of study for the Bachelor of Arts in Christian Ministry degree. This makes a total of 372 men who have graduated from Angola since 1995. Many of these recent graduates will continue their studies in the Master of Divinity program. Approximately fifteen others will be sent as missionaries to other state prisons, with one man being selected by Sheriff McCain to go to Grant Parish Jail in Colfax.

Because of precautions related to the pandemic, religious volunteers have been restricted from entering the prison. The mission of NOBTS to equip men for service in the local church has served the Angola community. The thirty inmate-pastored churches have been able to function for services and ministry throughout the pandemic. The ministry of the gospel remains strong throughout the prison community. The current student body consists of forty-two full-time undergraduate students. Because of COVID 19 the school has not received any new students in the last year.

Some of the goals of the NOBTS extension center are:

1. To recruit twenty new undergraduate students.
2. To send twenty graduates to other prisons as missionaries from the Angola churches.
3. To begin the Master of Divinity program.

Thank you for your prayers and support of this ministry. Many of our men are leaving prison and are leading productive Kingdom lives. To God be the glory! Through your support BAGBR is making an impact on 21st century judicial reforms and corrections. Only God could do such wonderful things. Men whose lives were judged too dangerous for society have become models of Christian virtue. Only God.

Chaplains Department Volunteer Services

The LCIW Chaplain's Department consists of two staff Chaplains, (one full time and one-part time), along with nine part-time Volunteer Chaplains and a volunteer Assistant Volunteer Services Coordinator. The senior Chaplain, Dr. Sharkey, also serves as the Volunteer Coordinator. The Volunteer Chaplains contributed 442 hours of personal time providing administrative support and pastoral care while making 629 offender contacts.

Volunteers continue to be the backbone of faith-based programs and represent the chief resource available to the Chaplain's Department at the LCIW. It should be noted that without the support of volunteers, it would be impossible for chaplains to provide the spiritual needs of offenders and effectively promote rehabilitation, spiritual growth, and emotional health. The DOC Volunteer training was uploaded to the DOC website so that volunteers may complete their annual training at any time.

The LCIW Chapel Department volunteers represent a diverse group. Volunteers are from various ethnic and religious backgrounds and range in age from young adults to senior adults. The LCIW volunteers contributed approximately 896 hours. Volunteers offer recovery, rehabilitation, hope, healing, and restoration of relationships to offenders through forty-two different programs and/or ministries. Ministries and Programs include but are not limited to recovery programs, worship services, Bible studies, faith-based college-level classes, pastoral care, grief recovery, individual and group counseling, CTRP Programs, counseling, new commits orientation and ministry to offenders in lockdown, the Infirmary and Assisted Living areas. These ministries and programs resulted in a cumulative total of 24,813 offender hours. Volunteers also distributed religious materials and personal hygiene products through the Chapel totaling 576 boxes. Boxes consisted of products such as soap, deodorant, lotion, shampoo, toothbrushes, toothpaste, pens, devotionals, and socks. In addition, holiday greeting cards and a variety of gifts were donated to offenders through the chapel.

The Chapel staff and volunteers continue to provide services and activities at both the JCCY and EHCC locations. The staff also provides pastoral support to the offenders housed at LSP.

CTRP Programs: During the 2020-2021 reporting year we had 7 CTRP Faith-Based programs: NOBTS Seminary, Celebrate Recovery Inside, Celebrate Recovery Inside Mentors, Life's Healing Choice, Life of a Single Mom, Onesimus, and Prison Fellowship Academy. During this fiscal year, we had a total of approximately seven hundred offenders attend. We also have six non-certified faith-based programs: Grief Group, Kairos Prayer & Share, Experiencing God, Hannah's Gift, RCIA, and Healing Place Church Bible Study which had approximately two hundred offenders attend. This year, 2021, we added Trauma Healing groups. Our Peer Ministers were trained to facilitate Trauma Healing groups.

Peer Ministers: This Volunteer Report would be incomplete without the inclusion of the efforts demonstrated by Peer Ministers, especially since volunteers were not permitted to enter the prison for most of the reporting period (September 1, 2020 through August 31, 2021). Volunteers were allowed back into the facility for a brief window, March 2021 through June 2021. Peer Ministers are offenders who have proven to be dependable, honest, hard-working people of character, equipped and willing to use their skills to minister to their fellow peers. Peer ministers led Bible studies, worship services, recovery groups, creative-arts groups, ministries to seniors and moms, and many other various programs and ministries. Currently we have 24 Peer Ministers who made 2981 contacts and 1498 hours through their Infirmary and dorm rounds. They conducted over six hundred services and small groups.

Additional Accomplishments and Events

- New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary had eighteen graduates walk for a commencement ceremony in May.
- Special services were held for Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Ash Wednesday and Easter.
- The chapel distributed Christmas cards and Mother's Day cards to each offender at JCCY, EHCC, and LSP.
- In September, even though the prison was closed to volunteers, Brother Dick DeBusk and his cook team provided a meal for every inmate at all three locations.
- In September, even though the prison was closed to volunteers, Janie Wise and the Baptist Women throughout the State of Louisiana provided gift boxes to every inmate at all three locations.
- In December of 2020, all offenders at JCCY, LSP and EHCC received a bath towel, a pair of fuzzy socks, miscellaneous candy, a shower cap and body wash.
- In December of 2020, Faith-Based donors provided funds to deposit \$18.37 into each offender's drawing account.
- There were 103 one-on-one faith-based reentry consultations by the staff chaplains.
- Numbers decreased due to COVID-19. Programming ceased and volunteers were not allowed to come onto facility grounds from March 2020 through March 2021. They were allowed back in March 2021 through June 2021 and then denied access July 2021 until further notice.

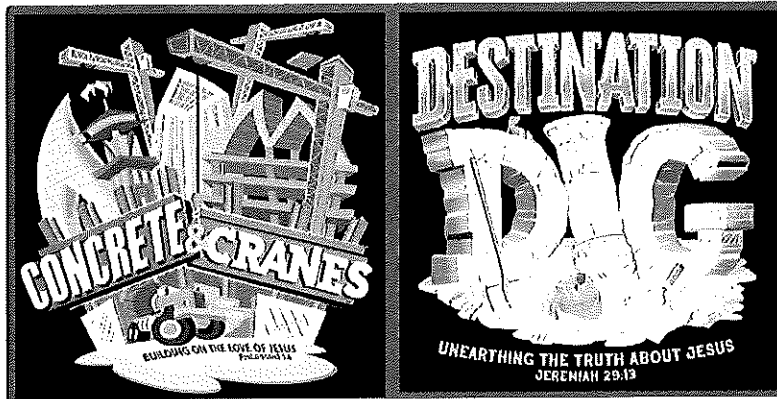

The 131st Annual Session of the Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge was held Sunday, October 18, 2020, at First Baptist Church of Baton Rouge. Financial Report BAGBR and Judson Retreat Center – Treasurer Dudley May presented both the December 31, 2019, and September 30, 2020, financial reports.

December 31, 2019 - The 2019 BAGBR budget was balanced with funds from contingency totaling \$25,297.61. The 2019 Retreat Center budget was balanced with \$36,612.31 from the centers discretionary fund. The balance in the restricted accounts (including contingency) was \$440,036.04.

BAGBR budget balance was \$54,967.94 for the month and \$58,191.54 was the balance for the year which included the PPP money received in May 2020. The Retreat Center budget balance was (\$14,474.88) for the month and (\$45,187.52) was the balance for the year which included the PPP funds received in May 2020. The designated accounts, BAGBR and Retreat Center total \$515,855.

Note: Dudley May reported that this year (2020) had been especially difficult on the retreat center due to Covid19 and the governmental guidelines the camp leadership was required to follow.

The financial reports were approved as printed. The financial reports, including the year ending December 2019 and September 2020, the annual church giving for 2016-2019 and January – September 2016-2020 are included the Book of Reports.

2021 Budgets BAGBR and Judson Retreat Center – Treasurer Dudley May presented a motion, from the Administrative Council and approved by Finance Committee, that the BAGBR and Judson Baptist Retreat Center 2021 proposed budgets be accepted. The 2021 BAGBR and Judson Baptist Retreat Center budgets were approved as printed. The approved budgets can be found in the 2019-2020 Book of Reports.

What can you say about 2020 that has not already been said?

As you review the following reports, you will discover some of what God did through our cooperative missions and ministries in what was, without question, one of the most challenging years in recent memory. Even in the midst of a pandemic and natural disasters, God's spirit was at work, God's people were at work, and lives were changed. So, I encourage you to take a few minutes and review these reports.

I have shared with you before that one of my favorite passages of scripture is found in 1 Samuel chapter 7 where Samuel called on the Israelites to put away their foreign Gods and serve the Lord. While the Israelites gathered, the Philistines decided it was an opportune time to attack. As Israel continued to repent and worship, God thundered against the Philistines throwing them into confusion while, at the same time, empowering His people to drive them back. Following that victory, Samuel set up a stone and called it Ebenezer, which means "the Stone of Help." As he stood before God's people Samuel declared, "thus far the Lord has helped us," (1 Sam. 7:12).

I believe it begins by each one of us looking inside ourselves and pleading with God to let revival begin in us. In these days of 24-hour news cycles and social media, it is easy to focus on what is going on around us and overlook what needs to happen within us.

God has been burning Psalm 139:23-24 in my spirit over the last several months. It's there David says, "Search me, O God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me and lead me in the way everlasting." Notice he says, "search me," "know my heart," "test me," "know my anxious thoughts," "see if there be ANY offensive way in me," and "lead me." This was all about David doing business with God. I believe God wants to do the same IN each one of us.

If revival begins within us, it can then spread among us. Over the next several months, please join me in praying this simple prayer, "Lord, change me."

Praying for your personal revival – and mine!

BUSINESS AND INFORMATION SERVICES TEAM

The Business and Information Services Team serves as a support group for all the work of the LBC State Missions Services. The team provides expertise in the areas of financial accounting, information technology, facilities maintenance, office services, and human resources as well as providing hosting and program services for conferences and camps through Tall Timbers. Our goal is to enhance and support the work of all LBC Teams, so they accomplish the missions and ministry goals of the Convention.

In addition to coordinating the Annual Church Profile (ACP) process for the state, Shana Johnson serves as **Information Services Support Manager** and is responsible for the overall information technical support systems of the Convention and provides assistance to several state entities that are housed within the Baptist Building. In cooperation with other SBC state conventions and national SBC entities, Information Services has been instrumental in developing an online database of all SBC congregations and leadership. This program has become the national database for all SBC congregations and all SBC entities, both state and national. The database consists of all information collected through the ACP each year, as well as information directly communicated to the office. All information is retained to maintain historical statistical and leadership information for each reporting congregation. Through her team's effort along with assistance from the entire State Mission Services Staff, ACP reporting of all Louisiana Baptist congregations maintains an above average reporting percentage within the SBC network of congregations.

The **LBC Accounting Team** provides competent tax and accounting information to Louisiana Baptist churches. In addition to supporting the finances of State Missions Services, we assist with questions on Budgeting, Accounting, Payroll Taxes, and Church Accounting issues. We are here to help you! Our contact information can be found on the LBC website. In addition, consistent with prior years, the Louisiana Baptist Convention received an excellent review on our Annual Audit Report.

Tall Timbers experienced no programmed summer camps in 2020 due to the pandemic – the first time in camp history. In addition, the campground sustained wind and flood damages from Hurricanes Laura and Delta respectively in the fall of 2020. However, director, Josh Bumgardner, and a reduced staff worked through the year to improve the facilities while hosting much fewer guests. The staff trusted in God's provision through the hardships of 2020, knowing that the need would be great for guests to reconnect at retreats and summer camps in 2021! Hotel room renovations will resume in 2021, as well as the completion of a new cabin, and the start of construction of a new swimming pool.

The Business and Information Services Team considers all its various areas of support work as ministry unto the Lord. We count it a privilege to serve our Lord by serving our colleagues and Louisiana Baptists in the work of reaching Louisiana for Christ and strengthening our churches.

BAPTIST COLLEGIATE MINISTRY

Every report of 2021 will mention literally if not implied the Covid-19 pandemic's impact on ministry. BCM is no exception to this rule. We were impacted greatly by having to find new ways to reach students virtually and in person. The struggle made us better at reaching students because it gave our leaders new skill sets. We entered summer with loosened restrictions and had a very good summer missions program. Among the hundreds of students that went out to serve on mission this summer, we sent three GoLa VBS and youth ministry teams out. The Louisiana teams saw over sixty-five new decisions to follow Christ. Also, we assisted Level Ground Church of New Orleans in having their very first Vacation Bible School. One team spent the summer assisting churches in the Wyoming Baptist Convention in VBS, community evangelism, compassion ministry, youth ministry, and as camp counselors. That team saw twenty-four decisions for Christ.

BCM also held its first annual sermon scholarship competition. BCM students from around the state submitted videos of their sermons to a committee that listened and evaluated the presentation. Five young men were awarded scholarships for excellent submissions. We are planning to continue this program in 2021-22.

Below is an evaluation of impact the Covid changes brought to BCM. Shutting down for the quarantine allowed us to accomplish several important tasks for our ministry.

1. Buildings received much need updating and maintenance.
2. Staff received extra training in the area of digital communication including Webex seminars, Zoom meetings, and meeting rooms in FB groups.
3. We began to utilize these formats for reaching out to incoming freshmen earlier than ever by forming freshman meet and greet groups on Zoom weekly.
4. The University campuses became more generous by giving us contact information for incoming freshman and relying on BCM staff to serve in an advisory capacity with the campus officials and meeting crucial needs in the quarantine response period.
5. International student ministry has had an all-time high impact this summer, particularly at LSU. These students were stranded on campus without work visas or campus cafeterias. The BCM has been providing boxes of groceries, through donations, to around 90 families a week throughout the year.
6. Emphasis had to move from large events to primarily Gospel appointments and Discipleship.

There are many more good things that came from this time of struggle.

This fall BCM staff and facilities will be utilized to continue to reach the University city all over our state. There are adaptation plans in effect at every campus, and we will continue to strive to proclaim the Gospel daily.

COMMUNICATIONS TEAM

Pivot

Pivot became one of the most frequently used words of 2020. Due to the changing nature of the pandemic, we went from “all systems go” in January to lockdowns and quarantines in March, and finally a gradual lessening of restrictions as the year progressed. In 2020, you did not pivot just once. Pivoting became the norm as we attempted to prayerfully discern what God would have us do during what certainly was the most tumultuous year in recent memory.

We pivoted in WHAT we communicated.

Events were cancelled. Churches and individuals had to be informed. Information relating to the pandemic was regularly compiled, released, and updated. Resources designed to assist churches in navigating regulations, procedures, assistance, and practices were posted.

We pivoted in HOW we communicated.

Due to COVID, almost everything communicated had to be done via the website and social media. With the exception of the PPP (Payroll Protection Program), there was little to no regular mail or correspondence distributed.

In collaboration with our I.T. team, we utilized Zoom and GoToWebinar® software to virtually gather groups to communicate, encourage, and pray for one another. Some of the virtual events included:

- Small/Medium/Large church webinars dealing with the pandemic
- Statewide online prayer meeting
- Encourage webinars for pastors and pastors' wives
- Digital ReGroup Sunday School and Small Group training

This online communication was particularly helpful when the hurricanes hit in late August and September.

We pivoted in WHEN we communicated.

Pandemics and hurricanes do not keep regular office hours. Working remotely, the Communications Team posted and updated information as soon as it was received to assist churches and individuals looking for information and assistance. It was not unusual to post several times a day in an effort to keep the information current.

We also pivoted relating to our efforts to seed God's truth in every heart and every home via *Here for You*, our multi-media evangelistic outreach. COVID-related commercials were created, aired, and posted resulting in touching 95% of TV households across the state. Those commercials can be viewed by visiting HereforYou.org and clicking on Videos. In addition, more than 224,000 people were reached each month via social media and streaming services and our partnership with the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association saw 1,273 people indicate a decision for Christ!

What do these numbers mean? They indicate the seeds of God's truth were scattered in hearts and homes across the state – even during a pandemic! God promises that “some” of those seeds find good soil and the return on those seeds is 30, 60, up to 100 times more than what was scattered, (Matthew 13:3-9).

EVANGELISM AND CHURCH GROWTH TEAM

"Change Me" was the emphasis of the Evangelism Conference hosted by Summer Grove, Shreveport. We were challenged, equipped, and thrilled to gather online and in-person. Next year's ECON will be January 24-25, 2022. Our host is First, Covington.

Sean Keith is your Sunday School, Discipleship, and Revitalization Strategist. The Digital ReGroup Conference reached 1,000 participants, and helped equip pastors, staff, and lay leaders to reach their communities with the Gospel through small groups. Sean has spent much time preparing materials with a diverse group of pastors and church leaders to assist congregations with "ReFresh," a way for churches to start fresh and anew, especially in light of the pandemic.

Your Adult Ministries and Church Administration Strategist is Jeff Ingram. He coordinated the Senior Adult portion of ECON 2020 which was still well attended, despite the pandemic. He also led meetings across the state for the Louisiana Association of Baptist Ministry Assistants. His work in Church Administration is mainly in consultations with churches/associations that cover the following areas: Pastor/Staff Salary Breakdowns; IRS Compliance; Best Practices for Church Finance Committees; Church/Associational By-Laws; Code of Ethics for Ministerial Staff; Church Staff Job Descriptions; and Sexual Harassment & Abuse. Jeff also connects Louisiana Baptist churches with the GOLLA teams to help our churches with VBS and other summer ministry projects.

Brandon Lewis serves as your Youth Strategist. The Youth Evangelism Celebration ministered to 1,100 youth and adults in-person and online with many different spiritual decisions made during this powerful gathering. Camps were held this summer at Tall Timbers with 850 teens gathering for worship, equipping, and fun. Twenty-eight students made professions of faith and ten students indicated a call to ministry. In addition to the spiritual decisions made, students learned how to share their faith to return to their home mission field equipped to impact others with the Gospel. Students gave over \$4,600 for missions during these camps. Prayerfully, YEC will return to the Rapides Coliseum on November 21-22, 2021. Speaking this year is Clayton King with worship led by the Jason Lovins Band. Our concert guest this year is Crowder. For the safety of our students, our leadership continues to meet with Rapides Coliseum personnel to monitor the COVID situation and to follow appropriate protocols given by the state/national medical community.

Serving as your Children's Ministry Strategist is David Anderson. This year our children's camps returned to Tall Timbers with attendance of over 900. We know of 107 students who made professions of faith and the children gave \$4,400 to missions. VBS trainings were held in two locations this year with plans to expand locations in 2022. The Childhood Education Workshop which was cancelled last year returned with almost pre-pandemic numbers.

MISSIONS AND MINISTRY TEAM

The Missions and Ministry Team of the Convention remains committed to helping our churches reach their full potential in reaching our state for Christ. Highlights for the year include a highly successful church planting effort, strides in our compassion ministry engagement with churches, and a growing mission builder program. These highlights accompany the execution of new strategies in Women’s Missions and Ministry, Partnership Missions, Disaster Relief/Men’s Ministry, and Missions Education.

Church Planting

James Jenkins, Director of Church Planting, continues to lead the effort of Church Planting. His team is comprised of Lane Corley, our Anglo-Church Planting and Replant Strategist, and Carlos Schmidt, Language Church Planting and Partnership Missions Strategist. In partnership with our churches and associations, this team has worked to meet the goal of the 2020 Presidential Commission to plant 300 new churches by the year 2021. Even with the challenge of the COVID-19 pandemic, that number is now 277 or 92% of the goal. Churches planted since 2010, have now led over 17,000 people to Christ and church membership. Church planting has helped Louisiana Baptists to reach every people group including Anglo, African American, Vietnamese, Burmese, Chinese, Korean, Haitians, Eritrean, Arabic, Hispanic, and Portuguese.

Church Planting Orientation has moved online, with over 200 logging in for a monthly orientation to Church Planting and Replanting through Louisiana Baptists since April 2020. Greenhouse training for Church Planters is also moving to an online format with fewer in person retreats in the future. In the fall of 2021, church multiplication events will return with new roundtables on starting simple, disciple making movement focused churches and ministries.

Language Church Planting and Partnership Missions

Carlos Schmidt has continued to foster and affirm all the existing partnerships Louisiana Baptist churches and organizations have with missions’ projects in the United States and the rest of the world. These partnerships include Haiti, Belarus, Brazil, US Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico, Brownsville/Matamoros, Cape Bretton Island Canada, Yucatan Mexico, and Madrid. Carlos led Missions Ready Roundtables at New Orleans Baptist Association, CenLa Baptist Association, Washington Baptist Association, William Wallace Baptist Association, and Gulf Coast Baptist Association. Missions Ready Roundtables were scheduled in other associations but had to be cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Carlos partnered with the Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge to host two quarterly Asian Missions Leaders Fellowships. He also spoke at FBC Lafayette WMU meetings. He co-led in the formation of a Hispanic Southern State Hispanic Missions Coalition with the purpose of motivating, training, and mobilizing Hispanic churches in Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, Florida, and Louisiana to local and global missions’ opportunities. Carlos also is working in close relationship with “Mueven y Conmmueven” (formerly IMB Hispanic Mobilization), in missions local and global networking. Carlos has also participated in Zoom conversations with IMB personnel and with Southern States Partnership Missions leaders. Carlos has made IMB missions’ trainings available to churches who have requested assistance.

The Church Planting trip to Belarus in July 2021 was cancelled due to political unrest in the country.

Compassion Ministries

Jeffrey Cook leads efforts to engage Louisiana Baptist churches in Compassion Ministries. Many of our Louisiana Baptist churches are involved in some kind of Compassion Ministry seeking to: 1) Meet needs, 2) Build Trust, 3) Share the Gospel, and 4) Connect People to the Local Church. Jeff is assisted by a team of Association Compassion Missionaries (ACM) in several statewide associations. These workers are John Anderson, Deanna Corbett, Patrick Magee, and Pam Walker. Each ACM has hosted "Start Something"/Church Without Walls" meetings to encourage area pastors and church leaders to start new works of Compassion Ministry.

A new ministry has started in New Orleans that will have state-wide implications. Jacob Crawford is leading a Disciple Making Movement in New Orleans, utilizing Disciples Bible Study Strategies. Jacob is assisting our Louisiana Churches by training church leaders in DBS. Also, a Compassion Ministry Readiness Tool is being developed for online use to prepare churches to start Compassion Ministry.

Women's Missions and Ministry

COVID cancellations affected fall and spring women's events in 2020-2021, but they also gave opportunity for other ways of connecting with our audiences. Louisiana Baptist women donated and packed over 900 gift boxes for the incarcerated women. Ministry to Ministers' Wives partnered through the Louisiana Baptist website with the executive office for a night of encouragement in October. Embrace, the event for all Louisiana Baptist women, was held in March 2021 as a hybrid event. Women gathered in person for a one-day Bible teaching and worship event, while breakout conferences were offered on the Louisiana Baptist website. Four leader training events are scheduled in 2021.

Mission offering giving shows impacts of COVID, the hurricanes in 2020, and the ice storm of 2021. The greatest story, though, is the giving of many faithful churches. Our prayer is to be joined by more mission giving churches in 2021.

Missions Education

Missions Education had a wonderful start to 2021. The first event of 2021 was M-JAM at Tall Timbers. The great part about this exciting mission's event is that children were able to hear the Gospel message in a fun and exciting way and learn how to share it with their friends. Students were also able to meet a young pediatrician who serves with the IMB in Africa and learn about her ministry there. The 2021 total attendance for M-JAM will be higher than 2019, since we will add our first fall M-JAM at Parkview Baptist in Baton Rouge on October 30.

Our 2021 camp numbers have exceeded our 2019 camp totals! We are hosting two camps this year as opposed to only one camp in 2019. Over 550 people will be in attendance between both camps.

Jess Archer will be conducting several "Women Who Lead" training events around our state.

Men's Ministry and Disaster Relief

Men's Ministries experienced a change in leadership in 2021. Dr. Gibbie McMillan retired, and Dr. Stanley Statham was hired to lead our efforts in Disaster Relief and Men's Ministries.

Disaster Relief was able to conduct all five of our in-person training events that were held January-March 2021. The first training in New Orleans followed the strict COVID-19 guidelines for masking and social distancing. We had just over 300 volunteers attend the five training events.

We have made a concerted effort to increase online training options. In part, we desire to engage the younger generations in Disaster Relief training and believe they will be more likely to take part in the training if online courses are offered. We also want to be better prepared for future pandemics and other possible problems that could force another shutdown. We are currently planning on offering training in-person, online, and a hybrid model.

On May 17, 2021, Lake Charles had about 1,200 homes flooded that initiated a Disaster Relief deployment. We had about seven state conventions deploy DR teams to assist us with mud-out efforts. Again, COVID did not keep volunteers from responding to the needs of those impacted by the flood.

Volunteers also returned to the Bahamas for the rebuild at St. Matthews Baptist Church. They were required to have COVID tests before leaving the states and before returning. We hope to be able to send more groups in the near future to assist with the rebuild.

Mission Builders

Mission Builders strategist, Mike Shumock has worked with seven churches and one mission as well as putting on a roof for one church damaged from Hurricane Delta. He also consulted with and helped ten other churches and projects securing labor, materials, and providing information about construction needs.

PASTORAL LEADERSHIP TEAM

The Pastoral Leadership Team is available to serve churches of all sizes across Louisiana. Assistance includes training and working with pastor search committees, resumé services, leadership development, church administration, and prayer resources. We believe every church, of every size, in every area, is necessary and valuable in maximizing Gospel impact, and we are committed to assisting you towards that end.

Shepherd's Rest: From time to time, pastors need to step away to reflect and be refreshed. Your Cooperative Program gifts provide the opportunity for a four-week sabbatical for the pastor at no cost to the church. For details visit louisianabaptists.org/shepherdsrest.

Resume Services: Launched in March 2021, GoServeLA.org allows churches to post open ministry positions. Pastors and ministers seeking opportunities to serve can also confidentially post their resumes on the site. As of this writing, over 100 positions have been posted by churches.

Transitional Interim/Supply: Transitions can be tough, but they don't have to be tumultuous. Trained pastors are available to assist churches during the transitional period between pastors. Pastor Search Committees can also be prepared and equipped for their assignment. If a need arises for pulpit supply while the pastor is out, Louisiana Baptists staff are available to assist as schedules permit.

Granberry Counseling: Counseling is part of ministry. But there are times when the counselor (pastor) needs some Godly counsel for themselves or their families. Granberry has twelve (12) counseling centers across the state with licensed and trained counselors. Whether the need is for an individual, couples or families, a Godly, confidential listening ear is available. And, thanks to your participation in the Cooperative Program, there is no cost for pastors and ministers. Log on to granberrycounseling.org to set an appointment.

Singing Ministers & Singing Women: These volunteers gather each August to prepare for concerts in local churches, detention centers, youth intervention programs, and prisons. As they share their talents, they also share their faith. For more information visit LouisianaBaptists.org/pastors.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST MESSAGE

BAPTIST MESSAGE

Since our report to the Convention in November, the *Baptist Message* has been busy on multiple fronts:

- Our team has implemented a new publication schedule, trimming our print editions from 24 to 14 per year. This has caused us to be more mindful about the time-sensitive nature of some events to make sure we give enough advance notice to our readers so that they can plan to attend. Likewise, we are learning how to better integrate our coverage of events in our online reporting as well as our social media communications – giving advance notice of the events as well as publishing what resulted.
- On that note, we are working with our web developers to assess the utility of offering a phone edition to subscribers as an option for receiving our news reports, feature articles and information updates. Those who have a print subscription will have free access to the online content that originates in our newsroom. Those who purchase a web subscription would have the same access. Anyone without a paid subscription would have to pay a per article fee or simply subscribe.
- Until we complete the web architecture, the online paywall will remain off and the content will be accessible to anyone.
- In that regard, we are working to develop an RSS feed that would allow churches to post our headlines on their websites to add a dynamic component to their online content – and we already have a prototype. Members would simply visit their church website and click on the *Baptist Message* headlines to access our content. Again, individuals who have a paid subscription (print and online) will be able to view all the content that is accessible through the RSS feed.

In addition to the structural changes that we are working on, we have moved forward in developing a new feature for the web and print editions. The *Baptist Message* has obtained a repository of more than 6,000 Christian cartoon panels and already we have added this new content to the website. Now, we are looking at regularly using these in our print editions, possibly within a redesigned special features page.

As for reporting, we have been following numerous developments within the Southern Baptist Convention, including the lawsuit loss by the North American Mission Board at the U.S. 5th Circuit

Court of Appeals and the subsequent denial of its appeal by the U.S. Supreme Court. The case, *North American Mission Board v. McRaney*, now returns to the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Mississippi.

In effect, the Supreme Court decision means Will McRaney, the former executive director of the Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware, has prevailed in his effort to finally depose witnesses, including NAMB President Kevin Ezell as well as past and present trustee and employees. His legal team will now have an opportunity to present evidence to the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Mississippi in his claim about NAMB's "intentional interference with business relationships, defamation, and intentional infliction of emotional distress" related to his termination by the Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware.

Likewise, we have covered other critical issues related to the SBC such as the growing tensions about Critical Race Theory; the sudden resignation of Russell Moore as president of the Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission; and a growing plagiarism scandal involving newly elected SBC President Ed Litton, pastor of Redemption Church in Saraland, Alabama.

We also have followed closely the growth of the Conservative Baptist Network, more than 10,000 pastors and other individuals have joined, especially because of its origins in Louisiana, and now the formation of a state chapter here.

But our bread and butter continue to be the stories of Louisiana Baptists' missions and ministries.

Last year, we completed a 10-part series updating Louisiana Baptists' progress on completing the ten goals of The President's 2020 Commission Final Report.

One quick note: Due to pandemic restrictions and multiple natural disasters, Louisiana Baptists did not meet the goal of completing the 300th church plant in 2020 (since 2013). But our church planting strategists tell me that we possibly will celebrate that milestone sometime in 2021!

This year, we have been following up on the continued push by our congregations to fulfill their ministries while coming out of the pandemic restrictions as well as emerging from the devastation of three hurricanes and two major storms. We have been ecstatic to report, that through all the challenges, the Gospel has continued to move forward in the state and beyond our borders because of the continued cooperation among Louisiana Baptists.

OFFICE OF PUBLIC POLICY

The hectic pace for the Office of Public Policy has continued from 2020 into 2021. Last year, the Office of Public Policy was actively engaged at the national level with such issues as the C.A.R.E.S. Act and making sure that churches and evangelists were included in the Payroll Protection Program if they chose to participate. We also worked with federal policymakers to change the subsequent rules from the Small Business Administration to remove language that would have conflicted with our Louisiana Baptist beliefs about marriage and human sexuality.

This year, we have made our position known to national lawmakers regarding the so-called "Equality Act," which would remove the protections of our First Amendment rights that are outlined in the Religious Freedom Restoration Act. Essentially, the "Equality Act" would prevent the expression of our beliefs, thereby elevating the rights of lesbians, gays, and transgender individuals above those of Christians. The bill, H.R. 5, passed the U.S. House and is awaiting action in the Senate, but could be on hold for a while because of the threat of a filibuster by conservative members.

As important as that legislation is in its potential impact on religious liberty, there were equally critical bills in Baton Rouge, and the Office of Public Policy was there to represent the voice of Louisiana Baptists during the legislative process. We worked with state legislators and staff to influence the wording of legislation; testified before committees, providing key research to shed light on issues; and sometimes simply went on the record to state Louisiana Baptists' consensus beliefs about the matter as an appeal to legislators to do the right thing.

Fortunately, there are faithful men and women who are elected officials or key staff members, and they are working hard, too; and a number of these Christians are Louisiana Baptists.

The work by the Office of Public Policy included:

-- Sen. Beth Mizell, a member of First Baptist Church, Franklinton, championed S.B. 156 *Fairness in Women's Sports Act* that was drafted to protect the rights of girls and women by preventing biological males (who self-identify as women) from participating on teams designated for females. She successfully navigated the measure through both chambers, but the legislation was vetoed by Gov. John Bel Edwards. The Office of Public Policy worked with Sen. Mizell and other conservatives to rally pastors to successfully persuade lawmakers to vote for a historic veto override session. The Senate voted 26-12-1 to overturn the governor's veto. But 10 House members who voted for the measure during the regular session did not vote for it this second time, and the governor's veto was sustained, 68-30-6, two votes short of the needed override tally.

-- The Office of Public Policy provided testimony against H.B. 67, which would have legalized prostitution and elevated it to the same status as any line of work in the state. Despite testimony from proponents that mocked "morals" and urged members of the House Administration of Criminal Justice Committee "not to look to your pastor" for guidance about prostitution, the bill failed to get out of committee.

-- Rep. Danny McCormick, a member of Trees Baptist Church in Vivian, sponsored a religious liberty resolution to express the legislature's intentions regarding executive order violations that involve the exercise of constitutionally protected religious freedoms. The Office of Public Policy presented the bill to committees in the House and the Senate, emphasizing its potential to de-escalate conflicts when critical ministries (feeding, disaster relief, Celebrate Recovery, etc.) must be performed during statewide emergencies. Both chambers adopted the measure, 67-20-18 and 23-13-2, respectively.

-- Sen. Mizell and Sen. Heather Cloud worked with the Office of Public Policy to extend the life of two legislative task forces that were formed largely because of resolutions adopted by Louisiana Baptists. Mizell championed S.C.R. 68 which ensures that she will continue to lead the state effort to develop legislation to incentivize counseling for couples considering marriage and reconciliation sessions for parents in distressed marriage relationships. Meanwhile, Cloud pushed through S.C.R. 195, which renews the state effort to protect children from exposure to pornography. The work of these two groups was interrupted by the pandemic restrictions of 2020.

Moving forward in 2021, the Office of Public Policy will be working with local Louisiana Baptists and other faith groups in Tangipahoa Parish, to defeat the upcoming ballot referendum which would allow a defunct riverboat casino in Shreveport to relocate to Slidell. Also, two state groups, the Kentucky Baptist Convention and Kansans for Life, have reached out to Louisiana Baptists for help in passing statewide ballot measures like the Love Life Amendment that passed in Louisiana in 2020. The Office of Public Policy will continue to provide consulting support as they push to protect the pro-life laws in their respective states.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

Thank you, Louisiana Baptists, for the opportunity to partner in ministry. God is continuing to bless your Louisiana Baptist Foundation and we are grateful. We ended 2020 with over \$187 million in assets under management that represents funds owned by Louisiana Baptist churches and other ministries as well as gifts perpetually managed for Kingdom-impact. Every dollar generated on these funds represents another dollar to advance the Kingdom by spreading the Gospel.

In 2020, the Foundation adopted the LBF Vision200™ that will help provide the strategy of the Foundation for the next 20 years as it seeks to partner in ministry with churches and other ministries. We are driven to advance the Kingdom...one dollar at a time, one ministry at a time, one life at a time. The overall vision of this plan is to specifically advance the Kingdom through the Foundation's ministry by \$200 million over the next twenty years or less. Specifically, the Foundation will benefit the Kingdom through (1) facilitating planned gifts (example: non-cash gifts, estate gifts, charitable gift annuities, endowments, donor-advised funds and other special gifts beyond cash), and (2) serving churches and other ministries with funds management as well as other services to enhance their impact.

To accomplish the goal of \$200 million over the next 20 years or less, the Foundation has four overall objectives:

- (1) Planned Giving: The following are provided for a comprehensive planned giving emphasis:
 - A. Providing educational content to churches such as the *Louisiana Legacy* publication to provide to members practical ways they can benefit their church beyond cash,
 - B. Speaking in churches and other ministry organizations to educate constituents on being good stewards related to their estates,
 - C. Having robust planned giving website content,
 - D. Sending periodic communications to constituents,
 - E. Providing confidential one-on-one meetings with prospective donors on benefiting the Kingdom,
 - F. Having the infrastructure in place to facilitate the logistics of special gifts, and
 - G. Providing an opportunity for every Louisiana Baptist to obtain a free basic Will document when at least tithing her/his estate to a church and/or other ministry.

(2) Church/Ministry Services: Based upon a recent survey among Louisiana Baptist pastors, additional services are being added over time that focuses on church financial/management services. These additional services are part of the Foundation's additional overall emphasis, ChurchBiz Central™. The Foundation plans to launch the following additional services in 2021: church loans, payroll services, and capital/stewardship campaigns.

(3) Comprehensive Marketing Plan: The Foundation's comprehensive market plan initiative uses multiple communication channels that focus on the Foundation's services to help advance the Kingdom. The initiative also will further build its exposure across various social media platforms.

(4) Operations: The Foundation will continue to have a well-skilled and well-experienced staff that seeks to provide churches and ministries with top-tier service to help those organizations further enhance their impact on the Kingdom.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME AND FAMILY MINISTRIES

Dr. Perry Hancock, President and CEO

In its 121st year of ministry Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries continued its mission of providing love, care, and hope in Christ for children and families in need. The Children's Home provided a positive Christian witness through its residential child and family care programs, foster care and adoption ministries, Granberry Counseling Centers, Christian Women's Job Corps, Compassion for Kids, and Orphans Embrace.

The Children's Home provided ministry services for over 3,200 children, families, and individuals. Through its on-campus and off-campus residential programs, 113 children and forty-two homeless mothers were served. An additional 195 families received placement referral services.

The Granberry Counseling Centers staff provided professional Christian counseling for 907 individuals during the year. Through its Minister Care program, a partnership with the Pastoral Leadership division of LBC, Granberry provided counseling for 36 Louisiana Baptist minister families.

Christian Women's Job Corp provided educational and job skills training for 25 women and support services for 137 women. The ministry maintained its adult education certification with the state of Louisiana as an official HiSet training and testing site. Through its partnership with Women's Missionary Union and its World Crafts ministry, CWJC students served as artisans, producing over two hundred Christian products.

Through a growing community care ministry, Compassion for Kids, the Children's Home served over 2,000 economically challenged children and family members in northeast Louisiana. Compassion for Kids provides life essentials and the message of Christ, meeting both physical and spiritual needs. Projects are conducted in partnership with local LBC churches and ministries.

The Children's Home also shared God's love in word and deed through its international orphan care ministry, Orphans Embrace. Twenty-six children were served through Louisiana Reach Haiti at its Children's Village in Croix-des-Bouquets.

On campus, construction of the new recreation center was completed. The facility includes a gymnasium and a pool. Construction began on a third family care cottage. The building provides housing for four families who are served through the HomePlace ministry. The renovation of Hope Cottage was also completed. The facility provides housing for terminated LBC minister families and furloughing missionaries.

Louisiana churches once again provided support for the Children's Home through the Annual Children's Home Sunday Offering. Churches also continued to support children and families at the Home through the Fall Food Roundup which provides all the non-perishable foods needed for the entire year. In the summer, churches from across Louisiana donated their VBS offerings to support the children. Many churches provided additional assistance in various ways throughout the year and God used LBC Cooperative Program giving to share His love with those in need.

As a result of the support from our churches and the witness provided by the various ministries of the Home, many children and others experienced the joy of salvation in Christ. Thank you, Louisiana Baptists, for meeting needs and changing lives in Jesus' name through your Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries.

LOUISIANA COLLEGE
Dr. Rick Brewer, President

Louisiana College is a Christ-centered community committed to Academic Excellence where students are equipped for lives of Learning, Leading, and Serving. That mission proved to be both more challenging and rewarding during this past year.

This was definitely a year like no other, and in many ways not one anyone wishes to repeat. The continuing health safety issues from a pandemic with added shutdowns from Hurricanes Laura and Delta, and major interruption of services with an unusual ice storm, added much stress to operations at LC and to many of our students whose lives were disrupted.

The resilience of our student body, the relevant ways our faculty and staff reached out to students during the time of quarantine, and the reaction of our alumni—stepping up more than ever knowing the financial consequences of this worldwide pandemic.

For all of this and so much more, we give God all the glory!

Faith Integration

This year's fall semester kicked off with Curtis "CZ" Zackery as keynote for "The Awakening" challenging students with the Truth of the Gospel. He is one of LC students' favorite speakers. The first Christ, Church, Culture Conference of the academic year was held in October on the role of women in the 21st century ministry. Speakers included Victoria Dixon, Jess Archer and Dr. Amanda Walker.

In November, LC held another timely topic in its 5th Annual Values & Ethics Series—the biblical response to racism. Former professional baseball player Chris Singleton, whose mother was murdered in the Charleston, South Carolina mass shooting at the Mother Emanuel AME Church, spoke on the message of love and forgiveness. He was joined by Louisiana Sen. Katrina Jackson and Alexandria physician Dr. Greg Bevels.

In the spring, LC held two more C3 events. Dana Harris, the regional director for the Alliance Defending Freedom spoke in March on "Religious Rights and COVID-19." And in April, Prof. R. Keith Lofton from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, spoke on "Calling and Career."

Our 5th Annual God in the Workplace Lecture Series was held in March. Keynote speaker was Dr. Jay W. Richards, professor at The Catholic University of America, who spoke on "Money, Greed and God: The Christian Case for Free Enterprise."

In addition, LC signed articulation agreements with Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary allowing students to apply college credits to a Master of Divinity degree at seminary.

Grants and Recognition

Louisiana College was recognized by niche.com as the safest college in the state and the second most diverse. We are extremely proud of these recognitions and will continue to take measures to meet those standards. LC was also named a "Top 30 Christian College" by national research group BestValueSchools.org. This organization recognized schools that meet educational needs and maximize the student experience in the most affordable ways.

LC was recognized with several grant awards for bettering classrooms, living spaces, academic departments, and athletic areas. In addition, The CENLA Chamber of Commerce named the College's website the No. 1 Business Website in Central Louisiana.

The College was awarded two Board of Regents grants for theatre and business. The department enhancement grants total more than \$135,000 and provided for a business analytics classroom and a new stage for the theatre program.

Enrollment and Retention

Many of the recruiting events we typically hold every year were cancelled due to COVID. The state also cancelled the High School Literary Rally in 2021 as we practiced social distancing.

We continue to grow our numbers of dual enrollment students with home schoolers, Pineville High School, and nearly fifty from Menard High School. LC Admissions team also held mini-college fairs at churches across the state.

At the time of the completion of this report, the College was expecting 350 freshmen, which would be the largest class in the institution's history.

Academics and Athletics

In March, LC had its SACSCOC On-site Reaffirmation Committee visit for our 10-year accreditation review. The committee informed the LC Leadership Team of no finding of non-compliance. Their report will be sent to the Board of SACSCOC for a final decision during the December 2021 annual meeting. The last time SACSCOC had no recommendations for LC was 1991.

LC and CHRISTUS St. Frances Cabrini partnered to establish the Cabrini Scholars program to provide unique economic support for nursing students. The program provides grant money to eligible students enrolled in the college's Accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing (ABSN) in exchange for a commitment of employment as a registered nurse.

The Master of Social Work program, which began in January 2018, received its accreditation this summer from the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE). The accreditation of this program, which since its inception has been to apply the Heart of Christ to the Hurt of Humanity, strengthens our goal to ensure our graduates are prepared to make a positive difference in the lives of the people and communities they will serve.

We officially moved from NCAA Division III to NAIA in July 2021. Membership in the NAIA provides opportunities for competing regularly in key recruiting areas of Louisiana while offering possibilities for competing for conference, regional, and national championships annually. All sports join the Red River Athletic Conference except football. Football will be a member of the Sooner Athletic Conference. This offers LC the opportunity to gain traction in some athletic areas we had not had previously and compete for some championship titles.

Advancement and Alumni Affairs

Your financial gifts to Louisiana College provide scholarships to phenomenal students, support the work of gift faculty, invest in innovative programs, and continue the LC tradition of academic excellence and a Christian commitment.

In the Office of Advancement, we received approximately \$5 million in unrestricted and restricted gifts to the College.

With more than 15,000 alumni worldwide, the Louisiana College Alumni Association was established in 1958 to connect alumni to each other, faculty, staff, and current students. In every way, LC Alumni are an extension of the mission of the college.

Alumni Affairs is doing spotlights on alumni in monthly e-blasts, and this has been added to the alumni page on the LC website.

We have migrated from a list of 68,000 names to about 20,000 with updated correct information in one location, and Alumni Affairs has increased our alumni committee numbers and participants thereby increasing alumni engagement.

Wildcat Club has been reinvigorated with new membership categories to better represent members' specific areas of interest.

Refurbishment and Resource Development

Major renovations were completed this year in Cottingham women's residence hall, and Tudor Hall and English Village, men's residence halls, thanks to generous donor funds. English Village had a complete makeover with new siding on the exterior, and renovations of the interior including new furniture and wall hangings, and new tables and chairs in the Commons Area where students can charge phones and computers, as well as fellowship with students, play games and attend events held in this space.

LC became the first institution in Central Louisiana to partner with Ardeo Education Solutions to offer a loan repayment assistance program that will allow all incoming freshmen beginning this fall to get help repaying student loans.

In resource development, 80% of our existing Wi-Fi network was upgrades and additional expansions to the network produced coverage in all campus buildings. Sixteen classrooms and labs were upgraded with new computers, and fifty-five laptops were purchased for faculty—most of whom had never had one before.

Canvas was officially launched as the new LMS (learning management system) for LC Fall 2020. With the challenges of COVID and other natural disasters, online education and new hybrid online learning tools were more needed than ever before. The Center for Online Innovation and Development (COID) launched and trained faculty and staff on best practices for tools such as VoiceThread and Teams, which allowed for the use of document cameras (Hover Cam8) and video systems (Vaddio) that were installed in larger classrooms. Students were then able to attend class virtually (synchronously and asynchronously). This move, offering more modality options for students to attend classes, required much more work from the magnificent LC faculty, but allowed for better retention and support for students in crisis/need.

In addition to launching Canvas, the COID has developed training and new benchmarks for the creation of online classes that meet Quality Matters standards. According to their website, Quality Matters "course review results in better course design, which makes navigation easier for students, reduces barriers to student achievement, and results in better outcomes." LC has focused on developing new general education courses and business major courses with an emphasis in project management. Students were able to attend classes with more flexibility during the uncertainty of 2020.

Online connectivity was also significantly improved across campus. Access Points (AP) were added across campus to ensure access to the internet. New switches were purchased and installed as well as many other technology upgrades to classrooms, dorms, and study areas. The library also added secure testing sites for online proctored exams.

This report captures the strategic planning and resolve of the last 12 months to rise to the challenges that came before us and the blessings that God has bestowed on Louisiana College.

I am grateful for all the churches of the LBC for your continued support through the Cooperative Program. As the need for Christian higher education continues to grow, your support allows LC to continue offering an affordable and accessible education. It truly would not be possible without you.

Thank you all for your continued prayers and support for this worthy, Christ-centered institution.

We will continue to follow His call.
