EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR LETTER TO THE ASSOCIATION 2023-2024 ANNUAL REPORT Dr. Tommy Middleton

Dear BAGBR Churches,

2024 was another very busy year and we are grateful for God's grace in all the different ministries of the Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge.

Mission Trips

BAGBR led three international mission trips this year.

- Our India Mission trip (February 16-26) was comprised of nine volunteers with three pastors including Clint Newsom (Zoar Baptist), Jeff Vincent (FBC New Roads) and myself. Other ministry and medical volunteers took part in the trip, with doctors from BAGBR churches Jefferson Baptist, Living Hope, Don Avenue Baptist, and a doctor from an SBC church in Fairfield, Texas.
- Our mission team to Japan, worked with our International Mission Board couple that is from Baton Rouge. David and Lydia Law Miller (daughter of Dr. Jim Law of FBC Gonzales) and their four children serve in Kobe, Japan. We took a team of 13, June 17-25, which was a cooperative effort with Jefferson Baptist, Pastor Bruce Worrell from Cedarcrest Baptist, and Pastor Jason McNaughten from Walker Baptist.
- This fall, we took a team to Eastern Europe with a cooperative effort of Jefferson Baptist and Redeemer Baptist. We worked with pastors, staff members, church planters, and the denomination leadership. Cullen McDaniel (Jefferson Baptist) and Preston Thompson (Redeemer Baptist) joined me for that wonderful week of ministry September 23-October 1.

Church Planting and Replanting

- Arturo Zapata is doing wonderful work in Ascension Parish, Iglesia Confraternidad, and growing a vibrant Hispanic work.
- In 2022, Sheldon Early planted a new work in the Zachary area with Life Changer Baptist Mission. They have also seen significant growth in the last year.
- May 5, 2024, Christ Covenant Church (Pastor Bradley Aucoin) replanted the Trinity Baptist Church at the old Goodwood Baptist Church location. It is now the Goodwood Community Church with Casey Williamson as the pastor.
- In September 2024, Fellowship Church in Prairieville (Pastor Kirk Jones) replanted Lake Martin Baptist Church with Jarrett Wells as the church planter.

Installations

It's always exciting when churches are able to call pastors, and we have the joy of being part of that celebration and installation.

- First Baptist Church of Baton Rouge installed their new pastor on June 16, Andrew Ogea.
- First Baptist Church of Krotz Springs installed their new pastor on September 1, Henry Wallace.
- First Baptist White Castle, install their new pastor on September 15, Andy Ardoin.

Ordination

- Rev. Michael Ferguson, Jr. was ordained on January 14 and is serving as youth pastor at Lanier Baptist Church (Pastor Mike Ferguson).
- Rev. Zack Brubaker was ordained January 28 at Jefferson Baptist and serves as college minister.

Easter Passion Week Studies

As most of you know, the week immediately before Easter (March 25-29, 2024) BAGBR sponsors Passion Week studies. It is a time in which five churches in a respective area of our association corporately gathers at noon during that week, eat together, and then have worship service focusing on one of Gospel's passion week passages. This year we studied John's account. Our churches that participated this year were:

- CITY (Baton Rouge) Jefferson Baptist, First Baptist Church Baton Rouge, Woodlawn Baptist, Family of Faith, and Stevendale Baptist.
- ASCENSION Parish Fellowship Church, Dutchtown Baptist, Ascension Baptist, Oak Grove Baptist, and New River Baptist.
- CENTRAL (Greenwell Springs area) Zoar Baptist, Greenwell Springs Baptist, Fellowship in Central, First Baptist Church Central, and Comite Baptist.
- WEST We are excited that this year we Expanded with five more churches, but this time on the west side of the Mississippi River: Gross Tete Baptist, Faith Baptist in Livonia, Erwinville Baptist, Fordoche Baptist, and First Baptist Church New Roads.

Churches currently without Pastors

- Bayou Sorrel and Bayou Plaquemine are without pastors, and BAGBR is helping to supply each with pulpit supply until their committees can select a new pastor or an interim pastor.
- Stevendale Baptist Church is being led by Interim Pastor Chuck Lowman.
- First Baptist Church Gramercy is being led by Interim Pastor Kerry Ash.

Missions

Missions continue to be important as we progressively focus on reaching the lost with the gospel of Jesus Christ.

The local association (BAGBR) had the opportunity to engage several of our pastors and churches in missions. BAGBR led three international mission trips this year.

- The team once again traveled to India in February. Nine others joined in with three pastors. Those traveling with Dr. Tommy Middleton were Clint Newsom (Zoar Baptist), and Jeff Vincent (FBC New Roads). Coupled with them were doctors, and medical teams from Jefferson Baptist, Living Hope, Don Avenue Baptist, and a doctor representing a church in Fairfield Texas.
- A mission team traveled to Japan in June to work with a couple, David and Lydia Miller with their four children who are from the Baton Rouge. They are serving in Japan with the IMB (International Mission Board). The team consisted of Dr. Tommy Middleton, Pastor Bruce Worrell, and Pastor Jason McNaughten. This trip also included volunteers from Jefferson, Cedarcrest, and Walker Baptist Churches.
- A team traveled to Eastern Europe in September as well. This included Dr. Tommy Middleton, Pastor Preston Thompson (Redeemer Baptist) and Brother Cullen McDaniel (Jefferson Baptist Church).

SBC Annual Meeting

The SBC Annual Meeting was held in Indianapolis, Indiana and BAGBR played a significant role. We had the opportunity to serve in several capacities, including serving at the NAAF (National African American Fellowship) booth and taking part in panel discussions.

Disaster Relief

We had to deal with a Category 2 Hurricane Francine in our area which brought flooding and some tree damage. We had the opportunity to assist in much of the preparation as well as the removal of several smaller trees in our disaster relief projects in the surrounding areas.

Strategy, Church Planting and Revitalization

This year we assisted many BAGBR churches with supply preaching and leadership that were without pastoral leadership. We also provided advice and assistance for new church plants and revitalization works. As Louisiana has become a NAMB Sending state, we were able to take part with many others from around the country to help assess an assessment team. We look forward to being on mission with God as He continues to send laborers to the harvest.

God has allowed BAGBR to celebrate and install the following new pastors:

- Andrew Ogea (First Baptist Baton Rouge)
- Henry Wallace (First Baptist Krotz Springs)
- Andy Ardoin (First Baptist White Castle)

BAGBR has also assisted in helping to provide leadership and direction for several of the new church plants, replants, and revitalization works. These ongoing works are led by:

- Bradley Aucoin and Christ Covenant Baton Rouge (Trinity Baptist Church Replant-Casey Williamson). It is now Goodwood Community Church.
- Steven Beckham and First Community Antioch Lutcher (First Unity Baptist Church Plant-David Brown).
- Ascension Churches (Iglesia Confraternidad Church Plant-Arturo Zapata).
- Checkers Williams and Renew Church Baton Rouge (Life Changers Church Plant-Sheldon Early).
- Steven Beckham and First Community Antioch Lutcher (New Day Church Plant-Ezzie Price).
- Kirk Jones and Fellowship Church of Prairieville (Lake Martin Replant-Jarrett Wells).

A Note from the Director

Greetings! I've got great news to share about the work and ministry of Acadian Baptist Center, "ABC". God has blessed ABC tremendously since its humble beginning in 1975. Formerly operating as Acadia Baptist Academy, a private boarding school, its parent organization, the Louisiana Baptist Convention, decided to close the school in 1973. Through the prayerful planning and leadership of community leaders Jim Loewer, Bill Prather, and others, ABC camp and retreat center was formed. Since its first summer camp of 18 GAs, ABC now averages over 12,000 campers annually, including 4,136 youth and children attendees. Fifteen years ago, we began partnering with Fuego, Inc. to lead our youth camps. Since then, our 6 weeks of summer youth camps have been booked to capacity at 500 per week. The remaining summer weeks allow an ABC sponsored Kids Camp, an Our Savior's Church Youth Camp and two apostolic camps to utilize ABC as well. In past years, we have hosted band, football camps, and deaf camps.

After summer camps end, weekends at ABC are usually busy with a variety of school and denominational groups. Some retreats and special events hosted by ABC include retreats for men, women, and couples. A popular kids retreat is Survivorman, along with Disc Golf tournaments. We have several Sr. Adult day-conferences as well. ACTS retreats are popular during the fall and spring.

The ministry of ABC has recorded 8.070 professions of faith, 6,426 rededications, along with 644 campers surrendering to ministry at our summer camps. We have also served as shelter in times of storm, welcoming hurricanes Katrina and Rita evacuees. We have also housed Red Cross, linemen. mission teams from all over the country who came to help in recovery efforts. Volunteers make up an important part of our ministry, with adult and college students helping on a regular basis. Organized ministries such as Campers on Mission and SOWERS send mission teams yearly to help with campus improvements.

Numerous capital improvements have been made since ABC started in 1975. These include but are not limited to the addition of 19 acres, installing a Jr Olympic-sized pool, a canoe lake, Nature Center, disc golf, putt putt, and ropes adventure courses. The addition of 13 buildings became essential. Most recent improvements include renovation of the dorms, construction of a new dining hall and 1,000-seat worship center.

To fund these camp improvements through the years, ABC has conducted two capital campaigns and recently launched our third capital campaign, "Further With Him" designed to complete payment of the worship center of which \$480,000 remains, upgrade our sewer system, build a 3 rd dormitory, and complete additional campus enhancements. Our goal in this campaign is \$1.8 million. To date, we have reached \$1.1 million in cash and pledges. Most pledges expand over the 3-year long campaign period. We ask that you please prayerfully consider helping our ministry that shares the gospel of Jesus Christ to Acadiana and beyond. We want to offer you a chance to come alongside us in the ministry of Acadian Baptist Center by making a pledge to our on-going "Further With Him" campaign. God will surely bless us all in this endeavor.





The Mission Statement of the Baptist Collegiate Ministry at Louisiana State University is "Knowing Christ and Making Him Known." The BCM is a religious organization serving the students on the LSU campus.

We exist to:


- 1. Reach students for Christ
- 2. Connect students to a local church
- 3. Strengthen students in their faith
- 4. Mobilize students for missions and leadership

The following are reports about specific ministry areas.

- 1. <u>Leadership Team</u> Thirty students serve on our BCM Leadership Team. These students plan, coordinate, and implement our BCM ministries.
- 2. <u>Freshmen Leadership Team</u> Over thirty freshmen served on the BCM Leadership Team for 2023-2024. We have over forty serving during this 2024-2025 school year.
- 3. <u>Attendance</u> Over four hundred different LSU students attended one or more of the BCM ministries during the 2023-2024 school year.
- 4. TNT Worship TNT Worship is held at 7:00 PM each Thursday night. TNT is a time of praise and worship followed by a speaker. Our average weekly attendance for the 2023 2024 school year was 100.
- 5. Evangelism Twenty-four students confessed Christ as Savior during the 2023-2024 school year.
- 6. <u>Ski Trip Bible Conference</u> -Our BCM students and staff participated in a Ski Trip in January of 2024.
- 7. <u>Mexico Mission Trip</u> The BCM went on a Mission Trip to Mexico in December of 2023. Seventy students and parent drivers participated in the trip.
- 8. <u>International Ministry</u> There are over 1,600 International students attending LSU from over 120 different countries. The LSU BCM sponsors a weekly International Student Dinner on Monday at

- 5:30 P.M. Over three hundred different International students attended the BCM during the 2023-2024 school year.
- 9. <u>Church Camp Staffers/Church Interns</u> Twenty BCM students served as interns at their church or at a church camp, such as Pine Cove, Sky Ranch, Centrifuge, Kanakuk, or Camp Ozark in the summer of 2024.

The Cooperative Program of the Louisiana Baptist Convention pays the salary of the BCM Director and half of the salary of the Associate BCM Director. The Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge, the William Wallace Baptist Association, and individual collegiate churches of BAGBR pay for the building and ministry expenses of the BCM. The BCM is also dependent on individual contributions from alumni, parents of past and current students and interested individuals.

The last school year was a great year for the ministry at Nicholls State University. The first part of the year (Fall 2023), saw traditional ministry efforts. The BCM served a dozen lunches on campus, which gave hundreds of students the chance to meet local churches and connect with their ministers. We featured several outreach dinners with different campus organizations targeted, from sports teams to Greek life (See the picture below – Phi Mu Sorority). These dinners resulted in many non-traditional BCM students hearing testimonies of God's redeeming love. The BCM also hosted weekly Bible studies with live music and

speakers all working to achieve Paul's mandate in Colossians 1:28-29. The BCM also spent countless hours out on campus practicing evangelism. God used these efforts to see lives transformed, Thank God!

The BCM also continued in our Gospel Appointment methodology, in which we make an appointment to share the Gospel with every single visitor to our ministry center. This focus has also done wonders in teaching our students about being vocal with their faith and giving them practical experience sharing this necessary message. We were blessed to see students accept Christ and pray to receive His love! One young man was then baptized into a local church! What a great fall! The spring semester saw a continuation of these efforts, and praise God we saw dozens of students continue in discipleship work. We also had over a dozen students sign up for our Spring Break



Mission Trip! These students went with us to Utah where we spent a week working with a local SBC church plant that is there ministering to Mormons. It was a great week sharing, building relations, and stretching our students to be more intentional with their faith (See the photo on next page). These students came back for the end of the spring on fire for God and eager to see summer missions accomplished!

- 8. At BRCC we also held a weekly prayer meeting on Mondays at noon.






- This Fall we are continuing all of our Bible Studies and Small Groups.

NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY THE JOAN HORNER CENTER, NOBTS, LSP, ANGOLA, LA 2023-2024 ANNUAL REPORT

Rick Sharkey, Director & Sr. Chaplain, LSP

Through many changes, God has blessed His work at Louisiana State Penitentiary. The population has decreased to 3900, the administrative staff have changed, and the upper-level wardens and staff have changed. What has not changed is the men's zeal for the Lord and their desire to prepare for God's call through theological education.

Here is a snapshot of what God has been doing. Many men have been released from prison on parole or pardon. There have been more than 400 graduates of the Joan Horner Extension Center. Approximately 300 of these graduates have been released from prison, only three have returned. That's about 1% recidivism. The state average is 29.6%. Of these men, many (17 last count) have been hired as chaplains and workers in the state of Mississippi corrections. One man is the Sr. Chaplain at Mississippi State Penitentiary at Parchman. Another is the new Bible College Director!

The current student body consists of 30 B.A. students and 31 M.Div. students. This semester's schedule looks like this:

The vision for this ministry includes sending trained missionaries to other LA state prisons. Thirty men are functioning in ministry roles throughout the state as missionaries. Two of these men are serving in a parish jail. After three months, they have reported 52 baptisms! The goal is to send two missionaries to every parish jail in the state. LOUISIANA CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTE FOR WOMEN - LCIW CHAPEL VOLUNTEER REPORT

2023-2024 Annual Report Dr. Debi Sharkey, Chaplain & Program Coordinator, DPSC

Dr. Debi Sharkey serves as adjunct faculty and the director of the Leavell College extension center at the Louisiana Correctional Institute for Women (LCIW). Currently, 18 inmates are enrolled in the seminary program at LCIW. In May, one student graduated and she is working the Baton Rouge detail at headquarters - a position offered only to trusted inmates.

The Baptist Association continues to provide volunteers and other valuable resources to the ongoing ministry at LCIW. Volunteers continue to be the backbone of faith-based programs and represent the chief resource available to the Chaplain's Department. It should be noted that without the support of volunteers, it would be impossible for chaplains to meet the spiritual needs of inmates and effectively promote rehabilitation, spiritual growth, and emotional health. The LCIW Chapel Department volunteers represent a diverse group. Volunteers are from various ethnic and religious backgrounds and range in age from young adults to senior adults. The LCIW Faith-Based volunteers offer recovery, rehabilitation, hope, healing, and restoration of relationships to inmates through different Faith-Based programs and/or ministries. Ministries include but are not limited to recovery programs, worship services, Bible studies, faith-based college-level classes, pastoral care, grief recovery, individual and group counseling, CTRP programs, counseling, new-commits orientation with ministry to inmates in lockdown, the infirmary and assisted living areas.

Over the course of 2024, LBC Baptist volunteers donated religious materials and over 600 boxes containing personal hygiene products. Boxes consisted of products such as soap, deodorant, lotion, shampoo, toothbrushes, toothpaste, pens, devotionals, and socks. Every inmate received a special box filled with personal hygiene products. Extra boxes were kept in storage to be distributed to each new commit throughout the year. In addition, holiday greeting cards, chapel office supplies and a variety of gifts were donated to inmates through the chapel. Baptist volunteers donated several textbooks and supplies for the LCIW Seminary extension center.

<u>Peer Ministers (Inmate graduates of the Seminary)</u>: This Volunteer Report would be incomplete without the inclusion of the efforts demonstrated by Peer Ministers. Peer Ministers are inmates who have proven to be dependable, honest, hard-working people of character, equipped and willing to use their skills to minister to their fellow peers. Currently, LCIW has 21 Peer ministers who lead Bible studies, worship services, recovery groups, ministries to seniors and moms, creative-arts groups and many other various programs and ministries.

ASSOCIATIONAL PRISON MINISTRY 2023-2024 ANNUAL REPORT

Louisiana State Penitentiary at Angola – After many years of faithful volunteers facilitating discipleship studies in the different camps and the education program through the NOBTS curriculum, the Gospel has not been stopped in prison.

<u>Camp C</u> – Volunteer Andy Granger facilitates the second and fourth Fridays in Camp C. Inmate teachers and ministers teach on the first and third weeks.

<u>Camp F</u> – Volunteer Earl Rainey facilitates in this trustee camp of Angola. The offenders are blessed with greater freedom than the other camps. Brother Earl reports that everything is going well at Angola though many of the members are taking time off to do their arts and crafts for the upcoming rodeo. After the rodeo we hope that the attendance will increase.

He also reports that they had two new facilitators join us at Camp F and they are definitely a God send. "We still need more facilitators in Angola. If you know anyone that loves the Lord, who is willing to show their love to the men that are incarcerated, I would appreciate it if you would have them contact me through the BAGBR office." Thank you, Earl Rainey

<u>Camp D</u> — Volunteer Mike Morris facilitates a Bible-based study at Angola's Camp D on the second and fourth Tuesdays from 6-8 p.m. He reports that the class enrollment is usually 40 or so. We try to maintain a limit near this number to keep the class size manageable and to encourage participation in the discussions. We use studies that are relatively current and applicable to the participants. Those study materials are provided by BAGBR from contributions received.

One of our recent studies was Tony Evans' "Watch Your Mouth." We used the verse, "Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in thy sight, O LORD, my strength and my redeemer." Our current study is "The Making of a Man," which is co-written by former NFL star, Tim Brown. The difficulty is finding studies that are still new and fresh for those who have been incarcerated for long periods of time and have participated in many such studies.

One highlight of our year was a worship service which we held in the chapel in the spring. This service allowed us to extend a wider invitation to other inmates not involved in our regular study. Bro. Tommy Middleton preached for us and emphasized a gospel call and challenge for believers. This was well received by those in attendance. Hopefully, we can arrange another similar service in the fall.

This December, we hope to provide gifts to our participants, which would include personal hygiene items, snacks, and perhaps a devotional book. Those are always received with much thanks.

Our hope is that we can be used of God as He brings men to the knowledge of Christ, and that we may help these to grow in their faith.

SEAFARER MINISTRY in GONZALES 2023-2024 ANNUAL REPORT Kerry Ash, Director

The Gonzales Seafarers' Center is a hospitality ministry of BAGBR to the merchant marines and port workers. Our bus and van allow us to transport the seamen from their ships on the Mississippi River to our center, Wal-Mart, Tanger, and other local stores. Hosting at the center opens opportunities to demonstrate the love of Christ. Homemade cookies, brownies and cakes are served with a large helping of the gospel. Most speak English so communication is not a problem.

This year we have seen 10 men and one lady give their heart to the Lord. The Saturday morning Bible study led by FBC Gonzales and English as a Second Language (ESL) continues to meet as does the class led by Fellowship Church in Prairieville. Other churches that have brought groups to the center or collected items for us are Zoar Baptist, Jefferson Baptist, Family of Faith, Parkview Baptist, FBC Donaldsonville, and FBC Napoleonville. Two churches have included us in their missions giving: FBC Gonzales and FBC Krotz Springs. We accepted invitations to speak at Family of Faith, Westside Community Church in Plaquemine, and Church at Addis.

In addition to sharing the gospel directly to over 1000 seafarers and port workers, we provided them with 652 Bibles and 1,234 tracts. We assisted Bro. Lee Gallion from Reserve Seamen's Center in a memorial service on board the St. Ajissi; we arranged for Captain Soe's daughter to be able to visit him on board his ship; conducted an Easter Service onboard the ship Clarabelle; shared meals in my home and saw seafarers interact with children from one of our local churches.

This year we were greatly blessed to receive a grant from the ITF (International Trade Workers Federation) enabling us to purchase a new Ford Transit Van to better serve. We currently have positions open for an Assistant Director and several volunteers. Be watching for information on a new Monthly Missions Workshop and opportunities for you to be part of mission/service team through the Center.

The term begins at the close of the Annual Meeting on October 15, 2023.

Financial

Treasurer Steve Bearry updated the messengers on the sale of the Judson Retreat Center property which closed on July 1, 2023. The 2.1 million received for the property was placed in the Louisiana Baptist Foundation a conservative liquid investment account until a decision could be made to the use of the funds.

He then reviewed the process that the Finance Committee and the Administrative Council followed when preparing the 2024 budget by taking into account 1) the financial health of the association (having had a deficit for 12 of the last 15 years), 2) feedback from the churches including the amount the BCMs are supplemented each year, and 3) concerns about using one-time funds for the ongoing operational expenses of the association. As a result, the 2024 proposed budget will fund the BCMs at the same level as 2023 with the following two provisions. First, next year a balanced budget will be presented. Second, the LSU BCM supplement will be reevaluated at the end of June of next year. If at that time receipts for the first half of 2024 are the same as or greater than 2023 then no changes will be made. If receipts are below 2%, the LSU BCM budget will be cut by \$5,000 for the remainder of the year.

Mark Robinson asked and received a second on the motion to accept the 2024 BAGBR Proposed Budget as printed and he allowed time for questions. The motion carried.

The following financial reports are included in the 2023-2024 Book of Reports for the messengers to review: December 2022, September 2023, Undesignated January-September Church and Mission Report 2019-2023, the Annual Undesignated Church and Mission 2019-2022. The reports can be found on pages 34-47.

Vice Moderator Kirk Jones, pastor of Fellowship Church in Prairieville, made the following resolution.

The BAGBR Petitionary Letters, Credentials, and Fellowship Committee met on August 13, 2024, to consider the request for membership from Pastor Brian Crain and Progression Church in Baton Rouge. Once approved by the committee, we presented Progression Church to the Administrative Council who also approved. We make the following motion:

Upon being officially interviewed and presenting all the required documents, we recommend Progression Church of Baton Rouge for membership into the Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge with all the responsibilities and privileges of a member church.

2024 Election of Member Church Messengers

The Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge requires that each member church elect messengers in advance and supply those names to the association. If BAGBR does not receive your list of messengers prior to the annual meeting, the names may be presented in writing prior to the beginning of the meeting during registration.

Also, the senior pastor of your church does not automatically serve as a messenger. He needs to be approved by the church and his name included on the list of messengers from your church. In addition, if you are a mission and sponsored by a BAGBR member church, your resident membership will be included with your sponsor church membership, therefore, you will need to contact your sponsor church for the number of messengers allowed. If you are a mission and your sponsor church is not a member of BAGBR, contact the association.

BYLAWS (excerpt) - ARTICLE THREE - BAGBR MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1. Membership in the Association shall consist of cooperating churches within the Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge, Inc.
- Section 2. Cooperating churches shall be those Baptist churches who cooperate with the Southern Baptist Convention, Louisiana Baptist Convention and which are domiciled in East Baton Rouge Parish, Louisiana, or in outlying parishes. Cooperating churches also shall be encouraged to contribute to the work of the Association through one of several methods outlined in the Manual of Procedure.
- Section 3. Each cooperating church shall be entitled to six (6) messengers for its first fifty (50) resident members or fraction thereof, plus one (1) additional messenger for each additional fifty (50) resident members or fraction thereof, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than twenty-five (25) messengers.

 The membership of church sponsored missions shall be included in the resident.

The membership of church sponsored missions shall be included in the resident membership of the sponsoring church. Messengers from church sponsored missions must be approved by the sponsoring church.

Missions sponsored by the association shall be entitled to one (1) messenger for its first fifty resident members or fraction thereof, plus one (1) additional messenger for each additional fifty (50) resident members or fraction thereof.

Section 4. Each individual messenger shall be entitled to one (1) vote at regular or special meetings of the Association.

In cooperation with other SBC state conventions and national SBC entities, Information Services has been instrumental in developing an online database of all SBC congregations and leadership. This program has become the national database for all SBC congregations and all SBC entities, both state and national. The database consists of all information collected through the ACP each year, as well as information directly communicated to the office. All information is retained to maintain historical, statistical, and leadership information for each reporting congregation. Through her team's effort along with assistance from the entire State Mission Services Staff, ACP reporting of all Louisiana Baptist congregations maintains an above average reporting percentage within the SBC network of congregations.

The LBC **Accounting Team** provides competent tax and accounting information to Louisiana Baptist churches. In addition to supporting the finances of State Missions Services, we assist with questions on Budgeting, Accounting, Payroll Taxes, and Church Accounting issues. We are here to help you! Our contact information can be found on the LBC website. In addition, consistent with prior years, the Louisiana Baptist Convention received an excellent review on our Annual Audit Report.

Tall Timbers is continuing to strive to provide a quality retreat and camp facility that honors the Lord, and desires individuals to experience life change through the power of the gospel. We share your desire to reach people who do not attend anyone's church. Since 2019, there have been over 2,000 searches for local churches and more than 4,300 indicated decisions for Christ.

What is our goal? To raise the creativity and quality of all we do in order to help you seek the lost, strengthen your church, and support cooperative missions and ministries. We pray that both you and the Lord have been pleased with these efforts.

EVANGELISM AND CHURCH GROWTH TEAM

Keith Manuel, Director

This past year's Evangelism Conference was hosted by Temple, Ruston and focused on a culture of evangelism. Next year ECON will be January 27-28, 2025, at First, Covington.

Sean Keith is your Sunday School, Church Administration, and Revitalization Strategist. Jefferson, Baton Rouge hosted last year's ReGroup and included a Spanish language track with an attendance of approximately 550. In addition, 300 people received small group training around the state. Fresh Start, our strategy for helping churches that need some form of revitalization, continues to connect with Pastors and churches. In 2025, ReGroup's locations are Franklin Avenue, New Orleans and Central Louisiana, TBD.

Lee Myers serves as your Youth Strategist. The Youth Evangelism Celebration (YEC) ministered to over 5,300 youth and adults. Summer camps at Tall Timbers saw an attendance of 1,364 teens gathering for worship, equipping, and fun. Over 104 students made decisions for the Lord, with 13 responding to a call to ministry. In addition to the spiritual decisions made at camps and YEC, students learned how to share their faith and returned home equipped to impact others with the Gospel. Over 6,600 students learned how to share their faith or personal testimony to share the Good News. We are praying for a great YEC, November 24-25, 2024, at the Rapides Coliseum in Alexandria.

Serving as your Children's Ministry Strategist is David Anderson. This year our children's camps at Tall Timbers had an attendance of over 1,194. We had 53 children make professions of faith and gave \$6,845 to missions. VBS training allowed approximately 300 hundred workers to learn how to lead their congregations through the most effective evangelistic outreach across the SBC. David also assists our churches with the State Bible Drill, Childhood Education Workshops, and a statewide retreat for Children's Ministers.

New to our staff as of July 1, 2024, is Kevin Ulmer who serves as your Evangelism Strategist. He will work in all areas of evangelism but especially in the areas of personal and church evangelism. He will also coordinate the Senior Adult Luncheon at ECON.

The Evangelism & Church Growth Team loves to serve you by training your leaders and church members in evangelism, discipleship, and age-group ministries. Please, contact us if we can assist you in any way.

MISSIONS AND MINISTRY TEAM

James Jenkins, Director

Reaching Louisiana for Jesus is the primary goal of the Missions and Ministry Team of the Louisiana Baptist Convention. Strategists on our team all focus their attention on helping our churches build a culture of evangelism in Louisiana. Below you will find the reports from every area of our work.

Send Network Louisiana

The vision of Send Network is to reach 1% of North America's lost population through planting 11,000 new churches that each reach at least 125 people with the gospel over the next decade. For North America, that means reaching 2.75 million people.

For Louisiana, 1% of our lost population would mean reaching 29,000 people with the gospel. That means that there are at least 2.9 million people lost without Christ in our state. To achieve this goal through church planting, we are working to plant 231 new churches that each must reach 125 new people for Christ.

In the last year, we have seen 35 church planters endorsed through Send Network Louisiana and nine new church plants in which over 500 people came to faith in Christ.

We have also developed a Send Network Louisiana strategic prayer plan. Our goal is to mobilize churches to pray for a movement of God in our state and to see lostness impacted with the gospel of Jesus. We are currently hosting weekly online prayer gatherings and seek to multiply these prayer groups to each region of the state: Southeast, Southwest, Central, and North.

Church planting has helped Louisiana Baptists reach people groups including Anglo, African American, Vietnamese, Burmese, Chinese, Korean, Haitians, Eritrean, Arabic, Hispanic, and Portuguese.

Language Missions and Partnership Missions

Carlos Schmidt

In partnership with Send Network Louisiana, three traditional Hispanic Church plants were started in New Orleans and one in Denham Springs. We are still working on two new Hispanic churches in New Orleans, one in Luling and one in Franklin, one Chinese church in Slidell, and a New Pilipino Church in Hammond.

In Language church development four Hispanic simple church evangelism trainings were conducted in the New Orleans area and two small group workshops were conducted, one in the North and one in the South.

Partnership Missions was instrumental in mobilizing a team of 14 people to Indonesia and collaborated on a DR Feeding team to Israel. Current partnerships still include Belarus, Brazil, Puerto Rico, Cape Bretton Island, Canada, Honduras, Yucatan Mexico, Indonesia, Senegal, London, Colombia, and Madrid.

Men's Ministry and Disaster Relief

Since our last report, Louisiana has suffered two significant wildfires, multiple severe thunderstorms, and tornadoes across the state. North LA recorded the most tornado warnings in recorded history (67). We have deployed chainsaw teams, chaplains, quick response feeding units, asset protection, and shower trailers to various locations.

Since the last report, several churches (Shady Grove in Pitkin, FBC, Slidell, and the Bridge Church Fellowship in Breaux Bridge) have suffered damage from storms, with Beulah Baptist Church in Mansfield, LA, suffering catastrophic damage.

We have deployed DR teams to Texas multiple times. LA DR operated a major site in Huffman, TX, for two weeks to assist the community in recovering from flooding. We also deployed a team to Pennsylvania for flood recovery work. A feeding team served for two weeks in Hawaii, assisting with recovery work related to the wildfire there. Members of LA DR participated with Texans on Mission to feed soldiers in Israel.

The Disaster Relief Rebuild Ministry continues to grow. We currently focus on the Point Aux Chenes area, which is predominantly an American Indian tribe. Former IMB missionaries continue to serve as our on-site coordinators, coordinating volunteer rebuild teams. Working with multiple partners, we have completed the construction of two homes.

We have also completed several homeowner site demolition and clean-up and many home repair projects in Pointe aux Chenes and surrounding communities. The first two home dedications will take place on

August 29, 2024, on the 3rd anniversary of Hurricane Ida and the 1-year anniversary of beginning the first new home construction. We are evaluating and planning to begin church property rebuilding project(s) in 2025.

Compassion Relief Ministry

Compassion Ministry seeks to 1) Meet needs, 2) Build Trust, 3) Share the Gospel, and 4) Connect people to the local church. Compassion ministry opens doors for evangelism through such strategies as ESL (English as a Second Language), Christmas Backpack Ministry, Drug Recovery, chaplain ministry, and food pantries.

We continue to develop a team of Association Compassion Missionaries (ACM) in several associations across the state. Each ACM is tasked to lead and start new compassion ministries.

Since our last report, we are working to expand the chaplain ministry by engaging pastors and laypeople in one of the seven disciplines recognized by NAMB. In the regular 2024 session, the LA State Legislature passed Senate Bill 123, allowing LA schools to employ or accept volunteer chaplains to support programs for students, teachers, and parents. The local school board must approve chaplains. The LBC Compassion Relief Ministry is developing a strategy to train school chaplains and assist in placing them in schools.

In August of each year, the SBC sets aside the last Sunday of the month to promote the Global Hunger Fund. LA Compassion Relief promotes this offering through the LA / Global Hunger Fund. The LBC receives twenty cents of each dollar donated, and these funds help support food banks and feeding ministries across Louisiana. The remaining eighty percent of the funds go to support Send Relief and the important ministry they engage in globally.

Volunteer Mobilization and Mission Builder

The Louisiana Baptists Mission Builder program has had a great year serving the churches of our state. We continue to prioritize our focus on serving mission churches to achieve their goal of obtaining a permanent place of worship to strengthen their discipleship efforts and to better serve and evangelize their communities.

In addition to our building projects, we have served many churches this year through consultations and assisting them in the planning phases of their building growth projects as they seek to expand their Kingdom impact.

We have had the pleasure of hosting volunteer groups from all around our state and from other parts of the country as they partner with Louisiana Baptist churches to achieve their construction goals.

The Mission Builder team was pleased to achieve three certificates of occupancy for projects this year which included two stand-alone structures and a storefront worship center. Please be in prayer for these churches as they are taking the next steps to better seek the lost and support cooperative missions and ministries.

Your Mission Builder team is looking forward to another great year of service to our Louisiana Baptists partners. Thank you for your continued support through volunteerism and the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering to make the Mission Builder program a success!

Women's Missions and Ministry

The Women's Missions and Ministry (WMM) Team continued to lead Louisiana Baptist women to serve and minister throughout our state.

Embrace, the annual WMM conference for all Louisiana Baptist women, was held in April 2024 at FBC New Orleans. During the conference, we celebrated 125 years of WMU in Louisiana! Leadership from 43 churches participated in the celebration.

WMM led Louisiana Baptist women to donate and pack over six-hundred gift boxes for incarcerated women in 2023. In 2024, WMM will hold one packing day in September on the campus of Louisiana Christian University. Our goal this year is to provide at least 600 boxes. WMM volunteers will distribute these giftboxes to the inmates at The Louisiana Correctional Institute for Women (LCIW) on September 27.

Ministers' Wives Retreat, a weekend of renewal and appreciation for our ministers' wives in the state, took place in October 2023 at Tall Timbers.

Louisiana Baptist churches remained generous in their giving for 2023. In fact, the Georgia Barnette Louisiana Missions Offering receipts were the second highest in the history of the offering! Our prayer is to be joined by more mission giving churches in 2024.

Children and Youth Mission Education

This year has been a great year for Children and Youth Mission Education. We held our first annual Teen Girls Retreat at Clara Springs Camp and Conference Center in Pelican, Louisiana, in March 2024 with 236 middle and high-school-aged girls in attendance.

Two Mission Jamborees (M-JAM) took place in 2024. M-JAM North was hosted by McClendon Baptist Church in West Monroe with around 180 in attendance. M-JAM South was hosted by First Community Antioch Baptist Church in Lutcher with around 65 in attendance. North and South M-JAM events will be held again in 2025.

Children's Mission Camp and Mini MAC in July 2024 had over 600 children in attendance with 28 different churches represented between the two camps. We had 265 in attendance for Children's Mission Camp and 357 in attendance for Mini MAC. This makes a total of 622 in attendance for both camps. We had 30 staff not included in that number. We collected \$1,645.09 towards GBO. Five decisions were made to follow Christ and more seeds were planted.

PASTORAL LEADERSHIP MINISTRY TEAM

Church Administration Resources: a Louisiana Baptist website devoted to numerous forms, articles and information related to all matters of church budget/finances, security, polices, committees, and staff.

These resources are provided to help pastors stay longer:

- > Pastor Appreciation month October: we all need encouragement from time to time, and October helps us show love and appreciation to all our pastors.
- > Pause Retreat: weekend for pastors and wives at Tall Timbers Conference Center. A wonderful time of worship, teaching, and fellowship.
- > **Shepherd's Rest:** sabbatical for pastors to get away to refresh and renew.
- > Granberry Counseling: we are blessed and privileged to partner with the wonderful staff and counselors at Louisiana Baptist Children's Home & Family Ministers for this service.
- > Church Conflict Summit: 18% left a church due to church conflict; 13% for burnout, 12% poor fit with church. Conflict can be managed and dealt with Biblically.

Sexual Abuse Response Council (SARC) continues to provide new and updated resources to churches and individuals for all matters related to Sexual Abuse. Information is available on our website www.louisianabaptists.org/resources.

Singing Ministers & Singing Women: These volunteers gather each August to prepare for concerts in local churches, detention centers, youth intervention programs, and prisons. As they share their talents, they also share their faith. For more information visit <u>LouisianaBaptists.org/pastors</u>.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST MESSAGE

In 2024, we celebrated our 137th anniversary as the first cooperative ministry established by Louisiana Baptists, and it is a pleasure to report that the news looks good for our entity as we move toward the future:

- -- The Baptist Message is on sound financial footing.
- -- Operationally, we have the right team in place and have refined our processes to ensure the best practices.
- -- Moreover, our vision "to establish a fellowship with Louisiana Baptists as a partner in the Gospel in reaching the lost in our state, the nation and the world" remains relevant as does our mission "to equip Louisiana Baptists for life, work and ministry."

During this past year, we continued to focus our reporting on the Louisiana Baptist Convention's efforts to restore a culture of evangelism among our churches. Indeed, in June we broke the news that baptisms had surged more than 31 percent in the past year among Louisiana Baptists, to a new post-COVID high of 8,770 salvations! This was on top of the nearly 19 percent jump that was recorded in 2022 – meaning that Louisiana Baptists baptized 3,140 more new believers in 2023 than in 2021 (5,630).

In the near term we are committed to specific coverage about the church planting initiative, Send Network Louisiana, which was announced a year ago. We will provide ongoing updates about Louisiana Baptists' partnership with the SBC's North American Mission Board to see God's Kingdom expanded in Louisiana by one percent over the next decade. Researchers estimate that 62.4 percent of 4,648,794 Louisianans are lost (or, 2,789,276). If successful, 28,875 Louisianans will be added to the Kingdom through 231 new churches planted in the state by 2033 (based on each reaching 125 people with the Gospel). These salvations will be in addition to those recorded by already established Louisiana Baptist congregations. Meanwhile, in the longer term, specifically the next 1-3 years, we will be developing and adding electronic products and services to complement our website and social media channels. We are conducting something of a "Nehemiah's walk" this year and possibly into 2025 to get a better understanding of what is being offered on other platforms and what would be beneficial to our newspaper readers and online viewers.

Office of Public Policy

The Office of Public Policy worked with Louisiana Baptist lawmakers and other like-minded legislators to successfully champion key legislation relating to moral issues and social concerns:

- -- Act 676, championed by Rep. Dodie Horton, a member with First Baptist Church, Haughton, is a first-in-the-nation requirement to restore, after about a 50-year absence, the Ten Commandments to every publicly funded classroom, kindergarten through college, in Louisiana. The displays are to be paid for by public donations, and proponents estimate that about \$100,000 in gifts are needed to outfit all Louisiana schools.
- -- Act 293, authored by Sen. Mark Abraham, a member with Trinity Baptist Church, Lake Charles, allows "Each city, parish, or other local public school board" to "employ or accept as a volunteer a certified chaplain to provide support, services and programs for students, staff, and parents."
- -- Horton and Rep. Raymond Crews, a member with First Baptist Church, Bossier City, successfully pushed through Acts 681 and 680, respectively. The first prohibits school employees from discussing LGBT matters during instructional time. The second, officially known as "The Given Name Act," requires schools to use an individual's legal name or a derivative of it and the pronouns that are consistent with a person's biological sex.

- -- Rep. Kim Carver, a deacon with First Baptist Church, Covington, authored Act 656, which bans social media companies from collecting data that can used to target advertising at minors, and Act 216, which requires any individual who provides care for or services to a child in a voluntary or professional capacity "to be offered training on the statutory requirements and responsibility of reporting child abuse and neglect."
- -- Act 436, authored by Rep. Roger Wilder, a member with Hebron Baptist Church, Denham Springs, requires facilities designated for biological females (dormitories, restrooms, changing rooms, domestic violence shelters, juvenile detention and correctional centers) to remain that way as a means to protect girls and women from sexual assault, violence and harassment by biological males.
- -- Sen. Stewart Cathey, a member with First Baptist Church, West Monroe, championed Act 586 to significantly strengthen penalties for human trafficking, with the harshest punishment for those who prey on minors for commercial sex. These more stringent sentencing requirements could figure prominently as deterrents to sex crimes early in 2025, when Super Bowl LIX comes to New Orleans. Sports championship events like it have been linked with surges in human trafficking for sexual activity.
- -- Sen. Adam Bass, a member with Cypress Baptist Church, Benton, pushed through Act 398 to expand the use of "safe haven baby box" (a climate-controlled, electronically monitored device that allows parents to anonymously surrender an "unwanted" newborn in a safe environment) to now include "any designated emergency care facility that is staffed continuously on a 24-hour basis, seven days a week, and 365 days a year" if it meets detailed requirements for qualified personnel on duty, constant monitoring of the baby box and essential equipment on hand to ensure the newborn's safety and health. The new law promises to rescue babies who otherwise might face abandonment in less ideal conditions.
- -- Sen. Rick Edmonds, who retired as pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, Shreveport, and now serves as pastor of First Baptist Church, McComb, Mississippi, carried the banners for adoption and school choice during the 2024 legislative session:
- -- Act 332 mandates that mothers who receive a "fetal abnormality" diagnosis for an unborn child must be informed about "resources, programs, and services for pregnant women and resources, programs, and services for infants and children born with disabilities" within 48 hours of such a diagnosis (to encourage and assist a mother and father to carry such a baby to term).
- -- Act 515 creates an "Adoption Awareness Program" that will "encourage the formation and maintenance of two-parent families." The Department of Children and Family Services must hire a vendor to facilitate marketing, create a website, and provide a telephone or video hotline, with each promoting educational information about resources that encourage adoption.
- -- Act 362 restricts adoption services in the state to "an adoption facilitator or an entity ... licensed in La. to assist in the adoption of children." This restriction applies even "to advertise for adoption services." It also requires these individuals and organizations to be designated as mandatory reporters of abuse.
- -- Act 334 authorizes "school choice options for parents, teachers, and pupils," by granting operational autonomy for "innovative kinds of independent public charter schools" from the control of city and parish school boards. However, these charter schools are still accountable for their academic results which will "be analyzed, considered, and repeated or replicated if appropriate."
- -- Act 91 recenters the authority for a child to participate in the "Course Choice Program" from the local school superintendent or other governing authority of a school to the student with his or her parents to make such decisions "after consultation with the person designated by the governing authority of the school."

-- Act 1, "Louisiana Giving All True Opportunity to Rise (LA GATOR) Scholarship Program" provides for educational savings accounts to support parental choice in K-12 education. Essentially, state tax dollars for education will follow the student "whether the child's best opportunities are found at a public school, charter school, private school, home study program, or at a faith-based or religious school." The program also ensures students in non-traditional school settings may subsequently participate in the "Taylor Opportunity Program for Students" (TOPS) which provides funds for postsecondary education.

Meanwhile, the Office of Public Policy collaborated with conservative allies to protect the state from perilous legislation that would have endangered the unborn as well as negatively impacted the general population, including pro-abortion, anti-traditional marriage and recreational marijuana bills:

- -- House Bill 98 would have deleted the Defense of Marriage Act from the Louisiana Constitution. However, we successfully argued in committee that DOMA should be kept on the books while social conservatives fight to overturn *Obergefell v. Hodges*, the U.S. Supreme Court ruling that legalized gay marriage.
- -- HB 164 offered to narrow the abortion ban in Louisiana by creating exceptions for rape (which accounts for less than 1 percent of all abortions in the United States) and incest (about 0.5 percent of abortions). Groups like Planned Parenthood would have exploited these loopholes to advise all their clients to claim rape and incest, effectively ending the state's abortion ban. The bill died in committee.
- -- HB 649 proposed a scheme to regulate recreational marijuana in case it was legalized. The bill was moved favorably out of committee but was defeated on the House floor (as a substitute bill, HB 978), with 58 against the measure and 36 in favor.

Although lawmakers handily killed this recreational pot bill, they rejected legislation that would have banned THC from hemp consumable products that are being pushed in convenience stores, local grocery markets and gas stations.

Importantly, the issue is not marijuana (cannabis, weed, pot) or hemp, but THC, which is the psychoactive element in both.

Moreover, the debate took place the week that news broke from sheriffs of various parishes about children being rushed to emergency rooms after eating THC candies shared with them by classmates (data indicates THC poisonings have soared 645 percent in the state).

In the end, most lawmakers bowed to the pressures from 1,500 hemp merchants who are seeing profits rocket from selling THC-laced edibles and drinks, and both chambers of the legislature eventually approved THC in hemp consumables (with some minor limits) via passage of HB 952.

Fortunately, conservatives in the U.S. Congress may come to Louisiana's rescue, with the House Agriculture Committee crafting a farm bill (Farm, Food, and National Security Act of 2024: H.R. 8467) that would "prohibit the commercial production, sale, and distribution of certain intoxicating hemp derivatives and products."

Church Self-Insurance Update

Louisiana Baptists have led the effort to establish a response to the church insurance crisis in our state, and major milestones have been achieved:

-- Act 259 was signed into law and authorizes the creation of the Louisiana Churches and Nonprofit Religious Organizations Self-Insured Fund.

- -- Leaders of six faith communities have volunteered to serve on the governing board of the initial corporation (they will create the permanent corporation that will administrate the self-insurance program). They held their organizing meeting August 6 and voted to adopt Articles of Incorporation and to apply for nonprofit status with the Louisiana Secretary of State and the Internal revenue Service.
- -- A state source for \$3 million of initial funding has been tentatively identified by Gov. Landry. This money will cover costs for catastrophic modeling and other steps needed to establish a premium schedule for participants. An estimated \$6 million of additional money will be needed to purchase the reinsurance policy for the first year of operations. The combined \$9 million of funding will be a one-time grant that will be replaced in future years by the ongoing premiums paid by participants.
- -- The Risk Program Administrators, a subsidiary of Gallagher Risk Management (Monroe) continues to guide our efforts to bring this program online, with a projected start-up date in the second quarter of 2025.

LOUISIANA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

Thank you, Louisiana Baptists, for partnership opportunities as we celebrate 80 years of ministry! We are grateful for God's blessings on the Louisiana Baptist Foundation. We ended 2023 with \$257 + million in assets under management, representing funds owned by Louisiana Baptist churches and other ministries and gifts primarily managed perpetually for Kingdom-impact. Every dollar generated from these funds represents another dollar to advance the Kingdom by spreading the Gospel.

In 2023, the Foundation continued executing its LBF Vision200[™] strategic plan that was initiated in 2020. We are driven to advance the Kingdom…one dollar at a time, one ministry at a time, one life at a time. The overall vision is to advance the Kingdom through the Foundation's ministry by \$200 million in twenty years or less. Specifically, the Foundation will benefit the Kingdom through (1) facilitating planned gifts beyond cash and (2) providing funds management and other services for ministries to enhance their impact. As of the end of 2023, the Foundation's current Kingdom-impact amount achieved is \$43+ million towards the 20-year goal of \$200 million.

To accomplish this goal, the Foundation focuses on four objectives:

(1) Planned Giving:

- A. Providing educational content to churches to teach practical ways members can benefit their church beyond cash (*Louisiana Legacy* publication),
- B. Speaking in churches and other ministry organizations to educate constituents on being good stewards of their estates,
- C. Providing an online platform for giving non-cash gifts to churches and ministries (www.Giving-Gateway.net)
- D. Having comprehensive planned giving website content,
- E. Sending periodic communications to constituents,
- F. Providing confidential one-on-one meetings with prospective donors,
- G. Encouraging individuals to impact their family and the Kingdom through their estates,
- H. Facilitating the logistics of special gifts, and
- I. Providing every Louisiana Baptist the opportunity to obtain a free basic Will document when at least tithing her/his estate to a church and/or other ministries.

- (2) <u>Church/Ministry Services</u>: The Foundation provides church-business-related services through ChurchBiz CentralTM to help churches and ministries increase their God-given funds. For example, the Short-Term Fund helps these organizations typically earn more on cash reserves and designated accounts than a bank. Other valuable services available include online giving and payroll services.
- (3) <u>Comprehensive Marketing Plan</u>: The Foundation continues to have a comprehensive communication plan that utilizes multiple channels to focus on services that advance the Kingdom.
- (4) <u>Operations</u>: The Foundation will continue to have a well-skilled and experienced staff that provides top-tier service to help organizations further enhance Kingdom-impact.

The Foundation continued toward its LBF Vision 200TM in 2024 by implementing a promotional focused on celebrating 80 years of ministry. For each new account opened, the Foundation will donate an additional \$80 to the new account. For each new gift created, the Foundation will donate an additional \$80 toward the gift.

The Foundation is grateful to Louisiana Baptists for ministry partnerships around the state over the last 80 years. We look forward to the next 80 years for His glory!

LOUISIANA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME AND FAMILY MINISTRIES

In its 125th year of ministry Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries continued its mission of providing love, care, and hope in Christ for children and families in need. The Children's Home provided a positive Christian witness through its residential child and family care programs, foster care and adoption ministries, Granberry Counseling Centers, Minister Care Residential program, Women's Learning Center, Compassion for Kids, and Orphans Embrace.

The Children's Home provided ministry services for over 8,000 children, families, and individuals. Through its on-campus and off-campus residential programs, 126 children and homeless mothers were served. An additional 310 families received placement referral services.

Granberry Counseling Centers provided professional Christian counseling for 837 individuals. Through its Minister Care program, a partnership with the Louisiana Baptist Convention Pastoral Leadership division, Granberry provided counseling for 38 Louisiana Baptist minister families.

Women's Learning Center (formerly Christian Women's Job Corps) provided educational and vocational training for 47 women. The ministry maintained its adult education certification as an official HiSET training and testing site and offered Paraprofessional Education and Banking Services certificates. Each day, WLC staff lead the women in Bible study and prayer.

Through its Compassion for Kids ministry, the Children's Home served over 7,000 children and family members. Items provided include diapers, toys, backpacks, school supplies, food, and other life essentials. Hundreds of Bibles and 1,000s of gospel tracts were distributed.

The new Compassion Center opened late in the year. The 15,000 square foot facility houses the offices of Compassion for Kids and serves as a distribution facility that provides life essentials to partner churches and other compassion ministries. The goal of Compassion for Kids is to reach 25,000 - 30,000 children and families in need each year.

The Children's Home also shared God's love in word and deed through its international orphan care ministry, Orphans Embrace. Thirty-four children were served through Louisiana Reach Haiti. The ministry is sponsored by the Children's Home and several Louisiana Baptist churches.

Throughout the year the Children's Home celebrated its 125th Anniversary. The theme for the observance was A Legacy of Hope. Special events highlighted the impact Louisiana Baptists have made on the lives of children and families in need since 1899. In July, a new Legacy Room was opened which features a ministry timeline and memorabilia.

Louisiana Baptist churches once again provided support for the Children's Home through the Cooperative Program and the Annual Children's Home Sunday Offering. Churches also met the needs of the children and families through the Fall Food Roundup, VBS offerings, and other special projects.

As a result of the support from our churches and the witness provided by the various ministries of the Home, many children and family members experienced the joy of salvation in Christ and were baptized in local churches. Many others made new commitments to the Lord. Thank you, Louisiana Baptists, for meeting needs and changing lives in Jesus' name through your Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries.
