# **Starting Something New** (Focus Group - Ethnic)

As Pastor Red Brick and Sister Grace, his wife, took their seats in the bleachers at the Local High School football game, a familiar voice called out to him, "Hey Red, you're late! They started ten minutes ago. You missed it. Our boys have scored already."

Pastor Red looked over at the voice and there sat brother Vision Nary, the Director of the Local Association of churches, with his wife, Angel. Vision was just the person Red wanted to see. While on their way to the football game Red and Grace made what they intended to be a quick stop at Walmart<sup>®</sup>. While there Red overheard a husband and wife and their three children talking in a language he did not understand. After listening for a moment, he realized they were speaking Spanish. Although Red had frequented the new Mexican restaurant in town (he was particularly fond of their chicken chimichanga), this was his first encounter with an entire family of Spanish speaking people.

As Sister Grace nudged him with her elbow and reminded him not to stare, the family's children began to talk among themselves in English. While Pastor Red pretended to be interested in something on the grocery shelf, he eavesdropped on their conversation. As he listened, he noticed that when the children spoke with the parents, they spoke in Spanish, but among themselves they easily switched back and forth from Spanish to English.

Pastor Red Brick recognized an opportunity to invite these people to church. He stepped around the aisle and introduced himself to the family. As Sister Grace realized they would be late for the football game, she told Red to meet her at the checkout lane and she continued shopping. Pastor Red Brick quickly nodded in her direction and introduced himself to the parents. He discovered the family was from Honduras, they had lived in the area for over a year, and the children attended the local school. Although the mother spoke no English and the children had to translate, the husband's English was good enough for Red to discover he worked in construction and owned a roofing business in town.

When Pastor Red Brick invited the family to church, the husband explained that since his wife spoke no English, he was looking for a church that had a Spanish service or at least one that translated the sermon into Spanish. With this bit of information, Red was stumped. The White Column Church thought it was open to anyone to come, but Red realized that because of the language barrier here was a segment of the population that was cut off from Bible study and worship in his church.

Never one to wait to be knocked over by the Holy Spirit, Red determined to start something new. He gave the husband his business card and asked permission to visit with the family in the coming week to talk about starting a Spanish Bible study at White Column Church, to which the couple quickly agreed.

Then, when Red saw Brother Vision Nary at the ballgame, he realized the chance encounter with the Hispanic family was a divine appointment. As Brother Nary tried to enjoy the ballgame, Red began to relate his encounter with the Hispanic family and to ask questions about how to start a new Hispanic Bible study and church. As Red's questions continued, Brother Nary realized that he was serious. As the opposing team scored their first touchdown and tied the score, he turned to Red.

"Well, Red," said Brother Nary, "You have to realize that the Hispanic people who are moving into our area come from all over Central and South America. As a result, they have distinct cultural backgrounds rooted in their national settings. You will need to learn all you can about their background. From what country do they come? What is their denominational background? Have they had exposure to evangelicals? What are their educational and professional levels? These inquiries will help you determine how to start this new ministry to the Hispanic population in our area."

"A second thing to consider," Brother Nary continued, "is to develop a portrait of the Hispanic household in the area. This can be done in part by discovering whatever barriers may exist."

"Barriers," thought Red out loud. "Well, you know Brother Nary, the wife did not speak English."

"That is good to know." Said Brother Nary, "Besides the language and the culture barriers, what other barriers exist? Do not assume the family has transportation. Are they here legally with their proper immigration papers?"

"Red," continued Brother Nary, "do they even have Bibles in Spanish? And, Red there exist other barriers that are not as apparent as the language. For instance if the family has a strong Catholic background, they will be reluctant to go inside an Evangelical church. You may have to begin a Bible study in a neutral location like a restaurant, a library, or even here on the Local High School campus in the cafeteria."

"You know, Brother Nary," said Red. "I had never considered the fact that some people have real and legitimate reasons why they do not come to our church. If they can't understand English, it would be hard for them to worship."

"You are right Red," continued Brother Nary, "they have real and legitimate needs you will need to discover. And you will have to meet some of those needs in order to gain their trust and confidence. Only as they begin to trust you will they listen to you about their eternal need to know Jesus Christ as Savior."

As the first half of the ballgame came to an end with the score tied, their conversation was interrupted. Their wives sent them to get some popcorn and drinks. When they settled into their seats again, Red continued the conversation.

"Brother Nary, what do you mean by their needs?" asked Red.

"Red," continued Brother Nary, "People have **real**, **felt**, and **anticipated** needs. A couple of real needs we already have mentioned. First, do they have transportation to get to work and to the Bible study? Second, do they have their legal documents to be in the country? These are real needs."

"As to felt needs, most Hispanic people arrived in our country because they felt they could make more money here than in their home country. Most of them will have the felt need to send money back to family and relatives in their home country. In addition, soon they will begin to feel like they need all the things related to the American dream. Soon the wife will feel like she needs a car. The children will feel they need a cell phone. These kinds of things are felt, but not necessarily real needs."

"You know Brother Nary," said Red, "I have never considered trying to reach them by helping to provide a need. I just assumed that people would come to church if we invited them and they knew where the church was located."

"Yes Red," continued Brother Nary, "Now you see that many people do not come to church because for them the church is not relevant to their lives. For instance, many Hispanic parents will attend a Bible study at your church because they want their children to mix with the English speaking children and youth at your church. Besides, sitting through one of your sermons may be the only opportunity the non-English speaking wife has to listen to English."

As the second half began, their wives looked at each other and elbowed their husbands.

Red's wife Angel said, "Can't you guys stop doing church work and enjoy the ball game? The second half is about to begin."

With that question the men decided to get together the next week and make some plans to get the Hispanic church started with the White Column Church as the primary sponsoring church.

We are having excellent response and involvement with our International ministry. There are 1,800 International students attending LSU from over 120 different countries. What an incredible mission opportunity.

Each week our BCM sponsors an International Coffeehouse from 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. At the coffeehouse we have times of conversational English and discussions about Christianity. We use outings as a chance to get to know the students and to help them find out about our ministry. During the Mardi Gras holidays, we took 30 International students to Houston to visit the NASA Space Center. Saturday, February 23<sup>rd</sup>, we took 27 of them to the Baton Rouge Zoo. March 2<sup>nd</sup>, we took the International students fishing.

One of our ministries is our Family Adoption. We are asking local church families to adopt an International student or students and have then in their homes or take them on an outing once a month during the school year. If you would like to participate, call us at 225-343-0408 or email us at lsubcm@eatel.net. Research reports that over 90% of the over 400,000 International students studying in the U. S. each year never step foot in an American home. What a missed opportunity! We hope to do something about this statistic at LSU!

We are finalizing our plans for our Mexico Mission Trip. We will leave on Friday evening, March 14<sup>th</sup> and return March 21<sup>st</sup>. We'll take over 125 students on the trip again this year. This will be our 17<sup>th</sup> straight year to sponsor this trip.

We hope to finish our Tiger Legacy Building Renovation in early April. We are making good progress. In fact, you are welcome to attend our Building Dedication Service Sunday, April  $27^{\rm th}$  at 2:00 p.m. at the BCM. This will be an opportunity for you to tour the building and pray with us over the future of our work.

It's been suggested by several local church members that we make a list of new items that local churches could provide for our kitchen and other rooms in our BCM. This would be a "shower" from our churches for our new BCM Center. We like this idea and are preparing such a list.

### Rep. Barrows Speaks at Elayn Hunt Correctional Center

Saturday night, December 18, 2007, Rep. Regina Ashford Barrows spoke at EHCC's (Elayn Hunt Correctional Center) second annual Graduation Service. She powerfully challenged one hundred fifty two inmates, twenty-six volunteers, and five EHCC administrative and security officials to continue their discipleship in following Jesus. The men gave her a standing and lasting ovation.


Chaplain Ross English has developed a Christian Education Ministry in which six diplomas were earned by men who proudly wore their caps and gowns. One hundred eighty one certificates were also awarded to other participants for their year's work. A certificate represents three months work, consisting of two hours of weekly group work and an average of 30 minutes a day of quiet time assignments. A diploma represents an average of eight certificates in a given area of study.

The weekly two-hour discipleship groups (attendance required) are led by one freeman and one inmate facilitator per six to ten students. In these groups, the men share what God did in their lives during their daily quiet times and work on learning to practice those truths. Since 2005, there have been 210 baptisms at Hunt.

The lavish banquet was provided by a cooperative effort led by Zoar Baptist Church, Baton Rouge and Progressive Baptist Church, Lafayette. These volunteers also led in serving the inmates at their tables instead of having them come through a serving line. This act of Christian servanthood deeply touched the inmates' hearts.

Enrollment for the spring semester has been boosted by the momentum gained from the Graduation Service. The men are already planning the 2008 Graduation. Thank you for your support, which makes this ministry possible. Pray for more laborers for the discipleship groups, tier visitation ministry, and revivals in our prisons. In our day of surveys and polls, we trend toward final results. Thankfully, regarding the *Experiencing Prayer with Jesus Conference* held in February at First Baptist Church of Baton Rouge, the results are not yet final. Here is a summary of a few of the things that we do know.

We prayed, we prepared, and people came...over 1000...from 100 churches in the greater Baton Rouge area and beyond. Saturday when BAGBR Director, Dr. Rodrick Conerly, asked for those outside our Association to stand, there were dozens! Registration was an indication that this event crossed denominational lines, and we were very pleased with the number of sister churches who joined us.

How refreshing it was for us to be ushered into worship from our hectic lives into the throne room by Ron and Patricia Owens. What a gift! They are a living testimony of servants who have worshiped and ministered for years.

The teaching by Richard and Henry Blackaby inspired, motivated, challenged, and blessed those in attendance. Seeing people return in the great numbers for every session on both days was evidence that they were hearing messages that were refreshing, new, needed, and anointed.

As I visited with people, I heard various comments from conferees:

- "I will never again pray my 'list' to God. He already knows my needs."
- "My prayer life has dramatically been changed."
- "I want God's agenda written on my heart."
- "This was the best attended Associational program in over a decade."
- "I wish more people could have been here to hear these messages."
- "Where were all the young people? I worry about the younger generation. Are we going to have pray-ers in the church after we are gone?"

But God is still at work. The results are not in yet, although we can share the following:

- Bible Study teachers of college departments and younger students attended the conference. They are already utilizing the principles they learned and are not only exposing young people to these principles, but they are teaching and modeling the concepts of prayer. Our younger generations need this so much!
- More books were sold at this conference than at most other Blackaby conferences! If you were unable to purchase any books, you may order resources through the Blackaby Ministries website at http://www.blackaby.org/resources.
- The Chaplain from LCIW attended the luncheon. Pray for him as he strives to incorporate the concepts and materials at that facility.
- A young adult woman named Magda from Capetown, South Africa, attended the conference. She is with an organization whose mission is to train prominent internationals to share

the Gospel to their culture. She 'happened' to be in town en route to a training seminar when some friends invited her to attend this conference. After receiving the proper permission, she plans to use some of the Blackaby materials on her radio broadcast, which reaches 180,000 homes.

So, you see, the results are not final. The question remains: what will you do with what you learned? Will you begin a book club in your neighborhood or at work and discuss prayer? We, the BAGBR PRAYER Team personally invite you to join us. Let God use you as an instrument to learn, teach and spread the word about prayer events in our area to your friends, neighbors and churches.
